Dear Paul,

This is to inform you of two of our adult leaders who have been involved in sexual encounters with our youth members.

The first is Alan Douglas Baker, who as far as we can determine, was registered as a Webelos Leader in both Packs 211 and 99. Upon being made aware of the problem in Pack 211 the other leaders obtained his resignation from Pack 211. Copy enclosed.

Shortly thereafter, we were made aware that he had similar problems in Pack 99 and he was immediately removed from that Pack and our roster. Enclosed are three news stories regarding his situation with the final one on his conviction and sentence.

The second one is Gerald F. Murray, Jr. who was Scoutmaster of Troop 136. Three reports are enclosed describing the incident. Also enclosed is a copy of his letter of resignation as Scoutmaster of Troop 136. He is presently undergoing treatment and the parents of the two boys are not, as we are told, planning any legal actions against him.

With this information I'm sure you will determine their status as far as the confidential file is concerned.

r eeting took place with Webelo and Den Leader Mr. Doug Baker. Otners that we. present were Mr. Tommy Simpson, Pack 211 Committee Chairman, Mr. G.E. Beam Jr. , Unit Commissioner, Pack 211.

The Pack 211 Committee requested Mr. Doug Baker to submit his resignation from the (2) two Den Units he was handling. Doug was asked to no longer hold any meetings or participate in any Pack 211 or Turkeyfoot District activities. The problem with Doug was recently brought to the attention of the Pack Committe Chairman Tommy Simpson, and Unit Commissioner G.E. Beam Jr. by the parents of the child involved. The incident was discussed with District Executive Mr. John Butler who was informed as to the proposed action to be taken by Mr. Simpso and Mr. Beam on this night.

The parents or child were not present at this meeting. They will be progressing on any further action or inquiry into the case on their own.

Baker was given the opportunity at this meeting to respond to the allegation and that of the action taken by Mr. Simpson and Mr. Beam on behalf of Pack 211. Effective November 16, 1981, Doug has discontinued all activities and involvement with the Leaders and Scouts of Pack 211. The results of Doug's voluntary action of resigning from Scouting activities does not imply any guilt on his part in reference to the incident.

This resignation is the direct result of allegations against Mr. Doug Baker and will be re-evaluated pending the outcome of any future inquiries or investigations into the matter. Agreement of the above comments is indicated by the signatures listed below.

### Man Sentenced To 3-10 Years

Alan Douglas Baker, 32, of 207 South Reynolds Rd., Lot 17, was sentenced Friday to 3 to 10 years in prison on a conviction of gross sexual imposition in the molestation of a 12-year-old boy. The sentence was imposed by Lucas County Common Pleas Judge Melvin Resnick.

Baker was indicted on four rape counts in January for engaging in sexual conduct with three members of a Cub Scout pack at his home. He was found guilty in May on a charge of gross sexual imposition after pleading no contest under a plea-bargain agreement.

## Toledoan Found Guilty Of Sexual Imposition

Charge Reduced In Case Involving Cub Scout, 12

A Toledo man was found guilty in Common Pleas Court Monday of a reduced charge of gross sexual imposition in the molestation of a 12-mar-old Cab Scout.

Alan Douglas Earch 32, of 207 South Reynolds Rd., Lot 17, pleaded no contest to the charge and was found guilty by Visiting Judge Richard McQuade, Jr., of Fulton County. Sentence was postponed, pending a probation report.

Baker had been indicted on four rape counts in January for engaging in sexual conduct with three members of a Cub Scout pack at his home.

Judge McQuade said afterward that the prosecution agreed to reduce the charges because of the difficulty of proving some charges beyond a reasonable doubt and the desire to avoid having the boys testify.

The boys' parents were questioned about the plea-bargain agreement and all said they were satisfied with it, the judge said.

Baker faces a possible 3 to 10-year prison term. He was the first defendant to be placed in the county's pretrial work-release program.

The program permits persons charged with a serious offense to keep outside employment while awaiting court proceedings. When not working, they stay in a dormitory area away from the general jail population and pay a daily lodging fee.

# Pretrial Work-Release Program

### Instituted By Common Pleas Court

Plan Lets Defendants year by common pleas judges here and Protect Job Interests **Under Supervision** 

Persons accused of crimes can be placed in a modified work-release program until they are brought to trial under a new arrangement that began Wednesday in Lucas County Common Pleas Court.

The first person to be assigned to the program is Alan Douglas Baken 32, of 207 South Reynolds Rd., Lot 17, indicted on four counts of rape for allegedly engaging in sernal conduct with three members of a Cub Scout pack in Toledo.

Judge Melvin Resnick assigned Baker to the program, saying that he must post 10 per cent of a \$25,000 bond and that he must not have contact with any of the alleged victims or their families while in the program.

During his arraignment Wednesday, Baker entered a plea of innocent to all four charges.

He is accused of sexual conduct with · three 12-year-old boys on four separate occasions last year during overnight stays at his home, police said. Baker recently resigned from his scout position, police said.

The judge said after Baker's arraignment that the pretrial work-release program has been studied more than a has worked well in other parts of the country, including Washington, D.C.

Traditionally, work-release has been a way for persons to serve sentences in a dormitory area away from the general inmate population of the Lucas County jail. They must pay a daily fee of \$6 to \$15 for their lodgings in the jail and are free only to go to jobs. They are permitted an occasional furlough.

Persons in pretrial work-release also will live in the jail and be subject to the same regulations as persons in the conventional work-release program, except for the provision for an occasional fur lough

The pretrial program has the advantage of allowing the work-release staff to keep daily watch on defendants while letting them protect their job interests. At the same time, the county is relieved of paying for the daily costs of incarceration

A defendant can continue to provide

financial support for his family without them having to seek public assistance as a result of being jailed, the judge

Any individual placed in the program will be screened by the work-release staff prior to admission, and a recommendation will be given to the defendant's trial judge.

Entry to the program will be based on the quality of the defendant's work record and whether he has strong ties to samily and friends in the community.

The judge said it is difficult to generalize as to what type of offenders will be considered for the program.

The greater percentage of cases will involve more serious offenses, but he declined to list what types will be considered, saying the program and the court system is not established to administer "cafeteria-style justice."

The program also has the advantage of imposing a structured environment on pretrial work-release inmates. Use of alcohol or drugs, which may have triggered criminal activity, is prohibited for those in the program, Judge Resnick said.

Pretrial work-release inmates will be able to avail themselves of counseling in the program as well as the services of the court diagnostic and treatment center, which are available to all persons charged with crimes, the judge

The judge said he picked a somewhat controversial case to inaugurate the program because he believes the man is a good candidate for it.

The defendant has no prior criminal record and is older than many defendants who appear in Common Pleas Court. "He's not an 18 or 19-year-old kid," the judge said.

In addition, he has good ties to the community, having recently made an offer to buy a house and his employer backs him, having agreed to post his bond. Baker is a truck driver for an Erie, Mich., firm.

Judge Resnick said his first placement in the program is a test to determine how well it works. It will be expanded only if it proves successful.

If used properly, the program will serve the same function as bail bond does - insuring the appearance of defendants at criminal proceedings, the judge said.
