I am writing this letter on behalf of Paul Wightower who I treated in psychotherapy for about a year at Family Counseling and Guidance Center, 49 Franklin Street, Boston. (topatment was terminated in May, 1972)

I understand from talking with Paul recently that he is now interested in becoming involved in programming for a troop. (troop no. 212 in South Boston) Although Baul had many problems which in the past would have made it inadvisable for him to pursue such an activity, I feel that the emotional growth which has taken place in him over the past two years as a result of his therapy and his marriage leave me feeling confident that he will be able to make an important contribution in the scouting field. I sincerely believe in Paul and consider him a fine person who is certainly worthy of another chance.

Gentlemen:

within the past two months, your deptartment received an application from me to be a Troop Committeeman for Troop 212, South Boston, Boston Council, District 2. This application was refused because your records indicate, that in February 1971, Boston Council notified you that reports of my involvment with a boy sexually in the troop were received by them. The incident in question took place five years ago in October of 1968 When I first began the Troop.

In Ma rch of 1971, when the incident became known, Court action followied. A suspended sentance was issued depending on my agreeing to psychiatric therapy. This was agreed to, and since I had already begun such therapy at my own initiation; the court agreed to my therapist and my cost rather than the Court's.

This application you received last month is for the same Troop with which I was previously Scoutmaster. About two months ago, I was approached by Mr. Joseph Abban, The Institutional Representative, and Mr. Arthur Paige, the new Scoutmaster of the Troop. They had just lost their previous Scoutmaster, my replacement. During those past $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, The troop's outdoor program and advancement program had all but died. The enrollemnt of active members went from 45 boys to 9 active members. The Camping program was nill, except for a couple of trips the Asst. Scoutmaster took charge of. The Troop Leaders are now planning an

extensive recruiting program in their area and approached me to enlist my assistance in this revitalization of the troop.

These Leaders are family men, with boys of their own in the troop, who are clearly aware of what transpired when I was Scoutmaster. They were my Assistants, the last two years of my tenure. They feel there is no longer any problem existing regarding my association with the Boys, and have even allowed their sons on camping trips with me. They are Willing to write you in this regard if you should request. Their addresses are on the Troop's Charter.

I have worked with Youth Activity groups since I was a teenager myself. Although never a player participant in the program, while in High School, I was a coach, manager, League President and Fublic Relations Manager for the South Boston Little League at different times. I was also active in the Red Feather Volunteer program as a Day Camp Counseler and Neighborhood House worker in South Boston.

After High School, I went to Cardinal O'Connell Seminary and St. John's Seminary in Boston to study for the Priesthood. While there, I was active in the Apostolic Program assisting Catholic Charities in the Archdiocese and ntutoring at Schools on my Days Off. During all of this time there was no problem such as what happened in the troop.

When I left the Seminary, due to a problem scholastically, I learned of the attempts to forma troop in my neighborhood. Since at that Time I planned on returning to the Seminary, after a year's leave, I asked if assistance was needed and signed as an ASM. Two months later, I was Scoutmaster.

During my five years as Scoutmaster, My Troop qualified for the National Camping Award each year, showed continued upward advancement, and a full activity program co-operating with Council activities. In my last

pear as Scoutmaster, I was awarded the Scoutmaster of the Year award in my District. When the incident became public, I voluntarily offered my resignation to the Troop Committee rather than have them have to request it. After I left the Troop, on a purely personal basis, I continued Camping trips with different boys who had been in the troop, with the full consent of their parents who knew all the circumstances surrounding the incident. These trips were to plaves such as Washington D.C., Pennsylvania, and New Hampshire. Again, there was no incidents or problems on these trips. During these last few years I have encouraged boys to stay in the program even though it was almost non-existent and achieve advancement at their own initiative. This past November, I married a girl form Jamaica Plain, and we know make our home in Dorchester.

You may ask, Why do I want to return to the Scouting Program. There are two reasons.

First, I admit I did scmething terribly wrong, and never have denied that fact; but through therapy, I was able to see the underlying causes, and it is no longer a problem for me. I feel a person should be judged on an overall look at him, not on just one item, but in the same regard, I can understand and appreciate your responsibility to the youth in Scouting to protect them. But Again, I can assure you there is no further problem and can document this. How Many other Scoutmasters can?

Mr. Fred Seipher, who was my therapist at the Family Counseling Service in Boston at the time I was seeing him, is sending you, in a separate letter, his feelings on this matter and an evaluation of wheather he feels I should become active in the program again. I Have requested this of him, but do not have any idea exactly what he will say. I feel I have something to effer Scouting. The Adult leaders of the troop must feel this way also, since they were the ones to approach me about attempting to return.

The Second reason is more of a selfish one really; We all want recognition for what we do. I was recognized during my tenure as a good Scoutmaster, barring this incident. If I am in a position to help Scouting again, I would like to have that official recognition on my record as a committeeman. Also, If my children want to be in Scouting, I would want to be an active part of it with them.

In closing, I know this is a long letter. I have no desire to ever be a Scoutmaster again. Maybe a notation could be made in my records not to be registered as SH or Λ_0M .

I feel I have to 'sell myself' to you. You don't know me of the type of person I really am. You can only go on what you have in black and white and what information you may receive from the Boston Council, who are aware of the efforts we are making, and who have been consulted in this regard. To make an affirmative decision to reregister me is, I know, a serious one and one to be very much deliberated. I know you will weigh all the information before you do decide.

May I Make two more suggestions. First, after discussing this with the Troop Leaders, I have requested that whenever I am at Troop meetings, activities or trips, that an adult be with me at all times, not that there may arise any problem, but so there will never be any question on it. Second, I am willing to come to New Brunswick, If this would expediate matters at all, to answer questions you may have or just talk to you about this. I am sure a time mutually agreeable to both could be arranged.

The job of Scoutmaster, as you are aware, deals with three main areas. One, developing an outdoor program for the boys; second, developing in the boys, citizenship and loyalty to their country; and third, that of developing character.

In the first two aspects of the jeb, I feel I have accomplished the goals of Scouting. The third aspect though, leaves a lot to be desired. As a Scoutmaster I have been negligent in my duty of teaching character and cleanlinesses the mind as well as the body.

For the past year new, a shadew has hung ever the trees and myself. Because of rumors and allegations concerning an incident a year and a half age, The trees has suffered, your beys have suffered and Scouting in this area has suffered.

It is too late now to correct the past. That incident coupled with recent discussions with the boys and suggestive actions have brought me to this point where I have been asked to resign.

It was my intention to resign after Summer Camp. This was the basic reason for insisting on more parent interest and co-operation in the troop. The last thing I wish is for the troop to fold up. I realized the adverse effect I was having in the area, but was not able to finish as I had planned.

I cannot offer excuses or a defense. It would be of little use new. I can only ask that you members and the other parents in the troop that I have been privaleged to associate with and call my friends, I ask that while you must look with disdain upon some of my actions, that you will also consider and look at my accomplishments and actions wish have been done in a good light.

All my time, all my efforts and hime have been for one purpose, Your son, his troop, and Scouting. This has been my whole life for the east two and a half years.

If it were possible to come to a reconcilment I would like nothing more, but I know there would always be that stigms of the past over my head, There would also be the lost respect for me by the boys, and there would always be the mistrust towards me in the minds of parents.

I effer my apelogy for what it is worth, for the harm I have caused. I ask only your forgiveness and parden. I have lost your friendship, I cannot ask for your centinuance of that.
