Re: Alleged Homosexual Activities of Ernest C. Emory

Dear Mr. Ernst:

I am writing you as chairman of a committee appointed by the President of the Occoneechee Council to investigate the alleged homosexual activities of Ernest C. Emory, former Scout Master of Troop 354, Baden-Powell District, Occoneechee Council.

After preliminary investigation of the situation had been conducted by professional Scouters, the committee of which I am chairman, composed of Mr. Charles Neely, Mr. Don Snider, Mr. Earle Beasley and me, proceeded to investigate the situation. Several committee meetings were held to interview Scouts, Scouters, parents of Scouts, Scout committee members, Mr. Emory and other individuals who might be able to provide information.

The committee interviewed with particular care Scouts who had made charges against Mr. Emory. Written statements were obtained from the Scouts and their parents or guardians. After reviewing the statements, these Scouts were carefully examined by the committee. In addition the committee talked with school counselors and school principals who knew the boys involved in an attempt to assure itself that the Scouts making the charges are generally known to be of good character, with a reputation for honesty. The committee is satisfied that the young men involved have a good reputation for honesty in their schools.

In light of all of the information furnished to the committee, and taking into account the statements of Mr. Emory denying the charges made against him, and the statements of various character witnesses produced by him, along with

the statements of Scouts of Troop 354 and their parents, the committee has decided that it is in the best interests of the Boy Scouts of America that Mr. Emory's registration as a Scouter be revoked and that he be prohibited from re-registering with the Boy Scouts of America in the future.

We are enclosing the statements furnished by the individual Scouts involved, along with letters submitted on Mr. Emory's behalf.

The committee recognizes Mr. Emory's fine background in Scouting and only regrets that it had to reach the conclusion which it has reached.





To Whom It May Concern.

I am writing this letter on behalf of my husband, Ernest C. Emory to whom I have been married thirty-one years. Out of these thirty-one years he has Fathered four very dear sons of our own, one of which died at the tender age of seventeen. The other three are grown, fine young men. Two of them, Jerry and Jimmy are here tonight with their father. The third son, Eddie lives in New Orleans.

For the past twenty-one years, Mr. Emory has been connected with the Boys Scouts of America. He started his services in 1955. This was the year my son Ronald, now deceased, was trying to get into the Cub Scouts. There were no vacancies, nor enough dens, packs or whatever to find room enough for him.

Mr. Emory attended a PTA Meeting at Clarence Poe School one evening and Mr. Bud Allers asked for volunteers from the audience for the Scouting Program Mr. Emory volunterred. In very short order, the entire Pack was, what you might say, dumped into his lap. Following their Dad, went three of our sons into a program which has been a whole life style for the Emory family.

Mr. Emory, along with his sons, started with Cub-Scouting, Boy Scouting and at one time an Explorers Post. Mr. Emory has re-organized and organized and organized a total of seven scout troops in the Raleigh area. By organizing, I mean, actually came up with Sponsors, Meeting Places, etc. from scratch.

I feel it would be a kindly thing to go back into some of the past contributions and judge from them what kind of man you are dealing with.

Speaking for myself, I am proud of the help my husband has been to his own scrus in his scouting endeavors. However, I know he has given as much or more to other young boys in this program and that there are many of these, who are now grown young men, who appreciate his efforts and energies provided them while in the scouting program. I also know that many, many parents also have, and have voiced their appreciation in my presence.

I, like many Scouters' wives, have felt like a Scout Widow. Fact of the matter, I have had thoughts to go as far, as wanting to divorce my husband, using Boy Scouts of America as my rival, or grounds for divorce. Can you imagine how far I could have come with such a plan? I would have been carted away to Dorothea Dix Hospital in a straight jacket.

Well, today, Gentlemen, it appears if I really ever had any intentions of trying to dissolve my partnership with Mr. Emory, now would seem a very good time, since he has been accused of homosexality, apparently judged, found guilty and sentenced by a very small group--both in size and in mind!

I know of very few parents who like to think of their children as being a liar and to believe Shatever comes from their lips is always the Gospe. I don't know what provoked the implications made against Mr. Emory, but I do know that in our society today that there is trouble in our schools, homes, scouting programs, etc. which is becoming uncontrollable because of two much permissiveness from adults, especially parents.

For many years, I have felt, and voiced my opinion, that I felt BSA was used for a Baby-sitting agency. I know, for a fact, that in many instances, the only time you can tell that a boy has a father, is when there is a feed or dinner put on which drags some of them there. In many instances, there is no father at all. Mr. Emory has tried doubly hard to help in some of these situations----to be fatherly to these kids and to render fatherly advice in many instances. He has also experienced one particular situation where one of his scouts stood in the middle of the floor in his home and called his Mother a damned lair. I merely mention this as I am sure you must be aware that all boys, just because they are in a scout troop are not little angels.

I was personally contacted by one scouts' Mother who told me how sorry she was about this whole mess and that her family was a Christian Family and they would pray for Mr. Emory, that they didn't believe any such rediculous accusations. She said, "please Mrs. Emory, stick by your husband's side through this." I appreciate very much her sentiments and kind gestures, but

I need no one to tell to stand by my husband's side. He is not guilty of these filthy allegations and I feel that as much of his time, money, efforts, etc. which he has put into the scouting program should be appreciated more by the BSA and officials concerned than the disgraceful manor that has been exhibited in the handling of the complaint.

Dear Mr. Thomas:

It is my understanding that recently Mr. Holland, Committee Chairman of Troop 354, sent to the Scout Office a request for an investigation of Mr. Emory because of implications of homosexuality. I also understand that the request was made by the "Committee of 354". As a member of the ""Committee", I would like to state that I was not consulted about sucn an investigation, and I want it clearly understood, and on record, that I will not be used to constitute a voice of authority in the name of a "Committee". As far as I know Mr. Holland was the only "Committee" member who wanted an "Investigation".

I again want to clearly state that I was not in favor of an investigation based only upon the evidence that came to the fore. I feel that the whole matter could have been resolved at a Troop level. I think the whole matter was handled extremely poorly on a Troop level, and from what I hear, on a Council level.

It is a sad day when a man has only to be accused to be found guilty. I do not think that Mr. Emory is guilty as charged, and I believe his years in Scouting would not be unblemished in this respect if he were.

My son, Phillip Jones is an Eagle Scout with God and Country Award and is presently a Newscaster for Scouting News in Explorer Post 5. Phil has been in a troop with Mr. Emory for the past five years, and has never heard one word from this fellow Scouts about homosexuality implications with Mr. Emory; and there have been many who would like to have given Mr. Emory all the trouble they could.

This Council and Scouting will lose one of the most dedicated men who has ever served their couse if "Red" Emory is removed from scouting; and I might add, May just shorten the years of an extremely sincere man, if is disgraced with this charge with no more evidence than has surfaced.

A surface investigation of a charge of this nature is ridiculous.

- 3. came in the next day while Mr. Emory was off with some other guys getting water for coffee and asked us if Mr. Emory had kissed any of us. We told him yes and he said that he had been kissed by Emory too.
- 4.. The next Monday night I quit scouts because of what had happened.

MEETING OF TROOP PARCENTS WITH MIR. EMORY.

PEQUEST FOR CONDUCT HELP CAMP AS A RESOUT OF THIS MESTING THIS IS A REPORT OF A MEETING HELD AT THE GARNER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ON 5 APRIL 1976 INVOLVING THE SCOUTMASTER, THE TROOP COMMITTEE, MEMBERS OF THE SPONSORING INSTITUTION AND CONCERNED PARENTS OF BOY SCOUT TROOP 354.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Arthur Clark, I.R. of record, and explained that there were allegations being brought against Mr. Ernest Emory, Scoutmaster of Troop 354, by He then introduced Mr. G. Thomas Smink, Jr. as the Council's Commissioner.

Mr. Smink, in an opening statement to the group, identified himself as a Council representative and the Assistant District Commissioner for this area. He said he was asked to mediate at this meeting, which he hoped would be a low-keyed, status defining meeting. He then introduced his wife as the secretary of the Committee for Troop 345, and that he had asked her to come along to take notes which would be turned into Council. Mr. Smink then returned to floor to the group.

then came forward to make his statement that Mr. Emory had been implicated in the charge of having homosexual activities with several boys in the troop. He noted that there were no hard facts, i.e. pictures, et cetra. He further stated that a man-implicated of such activities should not be allowed to remain in a troop as scoutmaster.

When the opinion that neither his boy nor other boys should be led by a man who was accused of such acts. He noted that he could obtain written statements from five (5) boys who knew of homosexual involvement. He also noted that he felt this could be settled without a court case.

wanted to have checked by a lawyer before turning it in to Council. He also said this meeting was not to be held until later when Council had dismissed Mr. Emory.

was asked who made the accusations. He replied that it was six (6) boys, two of whom are not in the troop any longer. Their mothers would not allow them to return to the troop.

A question was directed toward Mr. Emory asking why he had dismissed four (4) boys from the troop. Mr. Emory said that he had dismissed only one boy ((name given but withheld because of non-involvement in this matter)) from the troop. He stated that he had talked to four boys on different occasions about drug involvement. He noted that two of these boys did not return to the troop after this talk.

A discussion followed with Mr. Emory being asked several questions directed at the drug involvement. Mr. Emory related that the two boys who had not returned were questioned as to their suspected use of marijuana. Another boy was suspected of using marijuana and also smoking cigarettes with crushed aspirin in them.

Mr. Emory was then questioned if he had notified the parents. He explained that as part of his duties as Scoutmaster, he was to counsel with the boys and notify the boys' parents only after the behavior continued.

was asked if he knew about this drug incident. He claimed ignorance.

Further discussion followed with a question being directed to the as to their becoming aware of this (homosexual) problem.

questioned as to where she had heard the rumor. evaded the question and did not answer.

One Optimist Club member (hereafter collectively refered to as OCM) remarked that facts were needed and not just alligations. And that if the facts were not substancial, someone was in big trouble. It was asked as to the intended outcome of the charges and would the Optimist Club be involved.

Mr. Smink stated that if charges were to be filed, they must be presented to Council in written form and at that time Council should be requested to appoint an investigating committee made up of adult volunteer scouters. This committee would then examine the paperwork and probably question the boys and parents. If the committee found Mr. Emory guilty, a full report would be sent to National Boy Scout Headquarters and Mr. Emory would be barred from all future scouting activities. If Mr. Emory was found not quilty, the matter would then go back to Mr. Emory for legal action if he so desired. An OCM asked Mr. Smink if legal action could be taken against the Club. Mr. Smink responded by saying that he thought if the Club remained neutral and insisted on a Council investigation that no legal action could then be taken. Whereupon, an OCM directed to insist on an investigation.

A mother noted that she had two boys in the troop and that she, in talking with them, found no basis for charges of misconduct.

An OCM asked for more specific charges, stating that without boy testimony there were no specific charges.

when questioned, said he had statements from the boys but refused to make a detailed set of charges without the advice of counsel.

It was further noted that of the six boys involved, three were still active and the other three were inactive.

An OCM remarked that there must be a meeting between the accuséers and commissioners with a presentation of facts. Mr. Smink injected that this would take place with the investigating committee.

Someone in the group asked Mr. Smink if the troop meetings should be cancelled until the matter was cleared. Mr. Smink said a decision on this procedure would have to be made by the group; that he was not here to establish troop policy.

was again asked how he bacame aware of the problem in the troop. He replied that he had called parents of children involved in the incident. The parents talked with their sons and called back to report an afirmative answer.

In response to a question about the boys' willingness to discuss, with adults, what had happened, a mother said that the boys were ready to talk with anyone. The group decided not to question the boys at this time. A Troop Committeeman claimed that there was no intention of talking to the boys at this time. ((The secretary observed that the three boys who were no longer active were attending the troop meeting.Q) Further discussion revealed that "boys" did not include the entire six accusers, but only three of the boys.

Mr. Emory injected that these three boys were the ones involved with the dope. It was then asked if there was any connection between the two incidents.

to get together to make up this story.

A short discussion followed concerning the fallacy of this assumption. Further questions were asked about the time and place Mr. Emory supposedly made advances toward the boys. The answers were vague but did indicate they were taking place on camping trips. An OCM asked where were all the adults. Said there were no other adults along. A discussion followed concerning the lack of parential care and involvement in their sons; sctivities; with admitting that on the day in question he was at home.

An OCM asked how long this had been going on. implied that it must have been going on for some time due to the high turnover of boys in the troop. Mr. Emory then tried to explain why some of the boys had quit.

The discussion was interrupted by a mother again addressing Mr. Smink concerning the investigating committee. She expressed her belief that Mr. Emory would just be moved to another troop in some other part of town. Mr. Smink corrected her by saying that if found guilty, Mr. Emory's name would be placed on a Confidential List and would be barred from all scouting activities. If he was not found guilty, he could return to the troop. However, the committee would probably make a strong recommendation that he find a different troop with which to work. Mr. Smink also said that it might be wise if the boys invo. Med find a different troop after this matter is finalized.

In the matter of what to do with the troop until there was further investigation, an OCM, speaking for the President of the Club, suggested suspending all troop activity until the matter was settled. In an ensuing conversation about whether or not to close the troop, suggested keepingthe troop active by letting the assistant scoutmaster take over Mr. Emory's duties. When asked who was the assistant scoutmaster, responded, "Mr. Sullivan." Mr. Emory quickly pointed out that his son, Jimmy (James H. Emory), was

also an assistant scoutmaster on the Troop's Charter. When asked the whereabouts of Mr. Sullivan, responded that he (Mr. Sullivan) had not come to the meeting because he was sometimes violent in nature and felt it best not to attend. A verbal debate continued over who would continue the troop—Mr. Sullivan, Mr. Ernest Emory, or Mr. James Emory. One of the OCM asked if it would be agreeable for Mr. Ernest Emory to continue with troop meeting if a member of the Club was present at the meetings.

Again, the insisted on Mr. Sullivan taking the position; also stating that they would not permit their son to attend if Mr. Ernest Emory were present. Furthermore, was certain the other parents would not permit their sons to attend once they found out what was happening.

Another OCM suggested that James Emory be made scoutmaster pending the outcome of the investigation. Mr. Smink pointed out that James Emory was not old enough to be scoutmaster.

An OCM pursued the attendance of Mr. Sullivan to troop meetings and campouts. Said that his infrequent attendance was due to sickness in the family.

The OCM asked Mr. Ernest Emory if he would be willing to turn his duties over to an assistant scoutmaster. Mr. Emory agreed provided the assistant scoutmaster was Mr. James Emory. It was then suggested that both assistant scoutmasters conduct troop activities.

Some discussion followed.

Mr. Smink them summarized the decisions made by the group:

- 1. The Troop will continue with the activities of scouting.
- 2. The leadership will be provided by Mr. James Emory and Mr. Sullivan.
- 3. Mr. James Emory will carry the necessary information to Mr. Ernest Emory for posting in the books.
- 4. Mr. Ernest Emory will remain the official scoutmaster pending the results of the investigation; but, he will be invisible to the boys.
- 5. A member of the Optimist Club will be present at all troop functions.
- 6. Mr. Smink will check troop meetings as part of his duties as Assistant District Commissioner.

All those present seemed to agree with the summary. Mr. Smink then reminded not to tarry with the papers.

There being no further business, Mr. Smink ajourned the meeting.
