Dear Henry:

Since your copy of your letter to Mr. Saskin indicates you plan a fight in court, I would like to give you some information I have in the hopes that it will help you in the case of your innocence.

First, I can say this after talking with the arresting officers that the case is very airtight and you would have to introduce some very new factors in the case to stand any chance of winning. The prosecuting attorney, Mr. Ed Hill, indicated that if you wanted a trial instead of forfeiting bond you could probably get it, but in the event you were found guilty you would get a chaingang sentence.

Here is what you will be up against: Two policemen will testify that they observed you in the act through a trick mirror arrangement set up for that purpose. One will testify that he observed you constantly from the beginning of the act until his companion made identification with a badge over the wall. A third policeman will testify as to your behavior outside the restroom and as to watching the door for possible people coming and going.

If the lie detector test had proven you 100% clear it would have still been a heavy uphill battle to do anything, because it would have been inadmissible in court. If the lie detector test had proved 100% that you were innocent, my hope was to attempt to persuade the prosecuting attorney to have the arresting officers take a test or at least to try to have another test taken on you in Florida that would have been admissible as evidence.

The point I am trying to make is unless you can get some brand new evidence that makes a material difference or unless you can take a lie detector test that conclusively proves your innocence I only see one possibility in your fighting it and that is that you will go to trial if you insist on it and be proven guilty and be sent to a chaingang. In other words it will take something very strong in the minds of the Judge and Jury to change the sworn testimony of two policemen who were eye witnesses and a third who can offer indirect testimony. Incidentally, I must add that your statements about the height of the wall in the place were not true.

For Lewd Acts

Thirty-six white men, many of them from Tallahassee, were convicted or forfeited bonds in City Court this morning on charges of soliciting other men for lewd acts.

Fourteen pleaded guilty, 17 estreated bonds, two pleaded no contest and were found guilty and three were found guilty by Judge John A. Rudd after a trial.

One man was given a directed verdict of acquittal and cases of three others similarly charged were postponed.

Today's trials were the result of a large-scale roundup by City Police, headed by R. J. Strickland, chief investigator for the State Legislative Investigating Committee. The arrests have been made a few at a time over a period of two months. Most of the arrests were made in or near the restroom of the Greyhound bus station.

The charge against all those found guilty today was soliciting for lewd and lascivious acts.

Many of those arrested were transients, some from as far away as Oregon. Some were from neighboring cities. Twelve gave Tallahassee addresses.

Strickland said this was the largest number of arrests since the legislative committee began its checks on sex deviation more than a year ago. The Tallahassee roundup came on the heels of similar action in Panama City and Bay County a few months ago.

Most of those who pleaded guilty were given \$500 fines and short mandatory jail sentences by City Judge John Rudd. Most of the out of town accused forfeited \$500 bonds.

The cases handled this morning included:

Ten Allsman of Tallahassee pleaded innocent then changed his plea to guilty and was sentenced to \$400 or 60 days plus one day in jail mandatory.

Walter Davis Leverett of Tallahassee changed his plea from innocent to guilty and was sen-

tenced to \$100 or 30 days.

Jack Preer of Daytona Beach was given a 30 day suspended sentence after a trial proved he entered a hospital to undergo treatment. He had pleaded innocent.

Murray Hammond of Bushnell pleaded innocent and denied all charges but after a trial he was found guilty and sentenced to \$400 or 60 days plus one day mandatory.

ney H. Wells, 73, failed to appear for trial and his \$500 bond was estreated. Judge Rudd said if the university didn't fire the man, he would reinstate the bond and bring him into court for trial.

A Bushnell football coach, Murray S. Hammond, 40, also contested the charges but was convicted. He drew a sentence of \$400 fine or 60 days in jail, plus a mandatory one day in jail.

Jack Preer, 43-year-old Daytona Beach furniture salesman who also went to trial, was sentenced to 30 days in jail but the term was suspended on condition he enter a hospital for treatment.

Cecil H. Johnson, 30, a Bainbridge, Ga., truck driver, was convicted and was given the alternatives of paying a \$400 fine or serving 60 days in jail.

W. R. Davis, 51, Tallahassee store clerk, \$500 fine and 30 days in jail; Allen C. Pierson Jr., 32, sergeant at Tyndall Air Force Base, \$400 fine; E. L. Ballow, 39, Tallahassee insurance salesman, \$400 fine and mandatory five days in jail; Herbert G. Clinkscales, Jacksonville, \$400 fine and mandatory one day in jail; William O. Smithson, Tallahassee store clerk, \$400 and mandatory five days in jail, and Jack Phillips, 24, Tallahassee state employe, \$400 and mandatory five days.

Two men pleaded no contest and were adjudged guilty. Joseph Gwaltney, 41, of New Bent, N.C., was fined \$500 and John J. Heise, research assistant at Florida State University, \$400 fine and mandatory one day in jail.
