Dear Mr. Ernst:

Ten years ago, I was working as a District Scout Executive in North Central Washington Council, in Wenatchee, Washington, and a problem developed that made it necessary for me to resign my position. I was under psychiatric care from Dr. James Shanklin in Portland for some time. The problem was cured, and was caused by overwork and stress. I wrote to you about a year ago in requesting consideration be given for me to be able to clear my name in the records at National Headquarters. You stated that at the time I wished to register again with the Boy Scouts of America, that consideration would be given at that time.

I am interested at this time to reregister as a volunteer scouter, but will wait until I hear from you before proceeding. This has been an extremely important undertaking for many years, to restore my name in good standing, with the Boy Scouts of America. Scouting was a big part of my life for many years. I was an Eagle Scout, Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow, Scoutmaster, Explorer Advisor and a Professional Scouter, and now after ten years and no existing problem, and help through Dr. Shanklin, I am asking that I be cleared in your records and be able to serve as a Scouter again.

Presently, I am directing a Youth Care Center in Albany, Oregon. The past nine years I have been in the work of youth care, working with disturbed and delinquent children. I have worked for the same agency those nine years and have resided in Corvallis and Albany, Oregon during this time. I am a member of the Chamber of Commerce, Child Welfare League of America, Oregon Association of Child Care Workers, YMCA, and The Presbyterian Church.

If you need any further information or references, please advise. Any information you request, I will gladly forward to you. You have my permission to contact Dr. James Shanklin, Portland Medical Center, 511 SW 10th Ave, Portland, Oregon.

I hope a positive reply to my request of clearance can finally be made at this time.

Approximately nine years ago I was considered undesirable to continue as a Scouter in the Boy Scouts of America, and since that time have had no contact with the organization.


I have no plans to want to become active in scouting again, but do have a very serious desire to have my name cleared after nine years, and would appreciate knowing if there is a possibility at this time.

Dear Dr. Shanklin:

Mr. Robert Rusby has forwarded to us your recent letter concerning Donald Vance. We are very happy to learn that good progress is being made by Mr. Vance and that there is promise for continued improvement.

The selection of men for the professional service is contingent upon the man's potential for a completely successful career in Scouting. This same standard is used for men who desire to return to the professional service after having left it for any reason. Obviously, we are hopeful that Mr. Vance can again resume his professional career, but at this point it is impossible to predict the outcome of a restudy of his record should he reapply. We can assure you that at such time as he may reapply, the available facts will be studied and he will be given every possible consideration.

Unfortunately, our experience in a few similar situations has not been good. Men have been recommended as fully ready to return to former positions, only to have it soon become evident that they could not cope with the multiple responsibilities that constitute professional work. The tensions, strains and long hours of career work were just too much for them.

This will be our great concern for Mr. Vance. Even though he may greatly desire to continue as a professional, something

less strenuous or demanding might offer him greater opportunity for success and satisfaction. Unfortunately, all of our professional work follows the same pattern and we just do not have other kinds of work.

We do sincerely appreciate your interest in Mr. Vance. We also realize that his case may be different. We simply would not want to encourage his return to the professional service if it would not contribute to his physical and mental well being. Otherwise, we will be glad to cooperate in every way possible.

Dear Mr. Rusby:

Mr. Vance has been in psychotherapy regularly for the last eight weeks, beginning shortly after his release from the post in Wentichee. We have had psychological studies as well, and it appears that his particular problem, of which I am sure you are aware, exists on a somewhat neurotic, compulsive basis. This is encouraging, as individuals who have this particular difficulty often are highly refractory to treatment, but in his case, I feel that improvement and stabilization will result with continuing therapy.

I know the marked sensitivity of any youth organization toward this personality disorder; yet I feel in Mr. Vance's case, that definite rehabilitation will take place. I did not wish in this initial correspondence to go into any great detail, but I did want the office of the Boy Scouts of America to know that Mr. Vance is in treatment, that the prognosis is very hopeful, and I thought perhaps at a later date he might be reconsidered as an employee.

I am sure that, if this is at all possible, you will want much more information, and perhaps a conference with me with reference to what has been accomplished in Don's case. I will welcome an expression from you as to the feasibility of his returning to the guidance work within the Boy Scouts, after a suitable length of time.

On October 2, Stan Grimm, Scout Executive of the North Central Washington Council with headquarters in Wenatchee, Washington, called me. He reported that two fathers of Scouts had talked to him regarding the behavior of Donald Vance, District Scout Executive of that council. He asked for assistance and direction.

By changing my schedule, I was able to work with him. We interviewed separately two fathers and sons. From the information furnished, we were completely satisfied that Donald Vance was a sex deviate. When confronted, Don admitted that he was a pervert.

He was asked to write out his resignation which he did. He was also told to leave Wenatchee by the weekend, which he has done. He was told that his name would go on the confidential file. As per his contract, he was paid until October 31, 1962, but released immediately. All parties were most cooperative. It is my belief that less than eight people in Wenatchee know of this. I volunteered to secure from a doctor on our Regional Executive Committee the name of a psychiatrist who might be able to help him. This was done and given to him when he called the regional office today.

Don is now living with his parents, W. W. Vance, whose address is 114 East 38th St., Vancouver, Washington.
