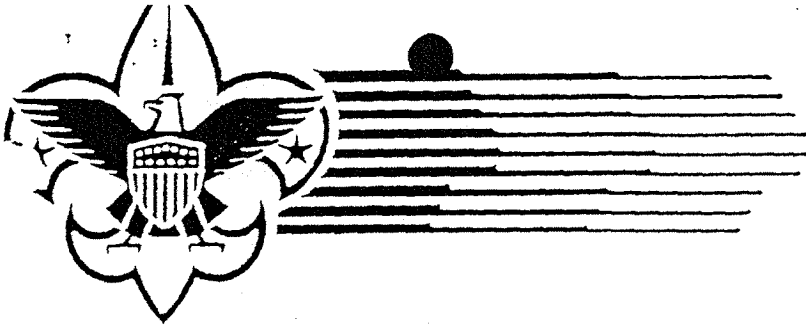

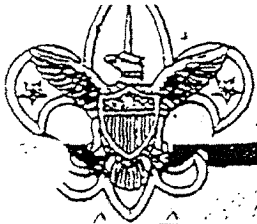

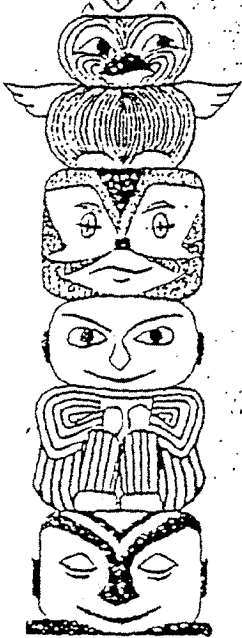

Mistrial Declared In Child Molest Case

Superior court Judge Gerald Ragan yesterday declared a mistrial in the child molesting case against a 40-year-old skipper of a Belmont Sea Scout Ship.

The trial was ordered to appear on March 21 when the judge will set a date for a new trial.

The six-man, six-woman jury was unable to reach a unanimous verdict after nearly two days of deliberation. The deadlock was eight for acquittal and four voting guilty. Judge Ragan said. The trial lasted four days.

During the trial three young boys testified that Stinger molested them during 1971 earplugs and straps which Stinger allegedly utilized to strap the children were entered into evidence, court clerk Jack Thomas said.

Defense attorney Angelo Prestarion of San Jose argued that Stinger made the earplugs for the children for safety and other safety reasons.

Stinger was charged with three violations of penal code section 268 — lewd and lascivious conduct directed toward some one under the age of 14.

San Carlos police cadet [redacted] indicated in his report that [redacted] activities May, 80 [redacted] 18 years ago.

According to police reports, Stinger took some of the boys for boat rides, apparently not in cooperation with Belmont Sea Scout Ship [redacted] where some of the alleged incidents of molestation took place. [redacted] free on \$10,000 bail.

Charges of child molesting were dropped yesterday against former Belmont Sea Scout skipper [redacted] after he pleaded guilty to a lesser charge.

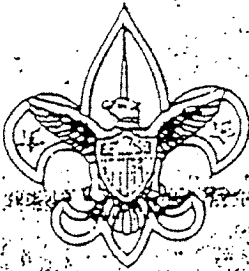

The former Sea Scout leader was accused of molesting one 12-year-old boy and two nine-year-olds when he was arrested last Dec. 23, following complaints from the youth's parents.

A jury which heard the original molest trial last month was deadlocked, unable to reach a unanimous decision of guilt or innocence. A new trial could have been requested by Dist. Atty. Keith C. Sorenson.

His deputy, John O'Leary, told Hartley that in negotiat-

ing a new charge and plea, Stenger was assured he would not be imprisoned, jailed or considered a mentally disordered sex offender on the condition he maintain psychiatric assistance. The judge set formal sentencing for May 11 at 9 a.m.

Sea Scout Leader Held For Molesting

A San Carlos electronic technician and former Sea Scout leader was arrested last night on a felony charge of child molesting after three young boys told police he had enticed them into his home on frequent occasions during the past year.

Stenger, 40, was arrested at county jail and later released on \$1,250 bail to appear January 1 at 9 a.m. in Southern District Municipal Court.

Detectives began an investigation after the boys, two age 11 and one age 9, told Police Cadet Randy Evans, a friend of the family of one of the victims, about Stenger's alleged activities.

One of the boys related that on one occasion he accompanied Stenger on a houseboat and was chained to a bed, investigators report. Another boy said he was chained to a chair in Stenger's home for disobedience.

Police Detective Tom Howers reported that investigators obtained a search warrant and found a quantity of harnesses, straps, chains, restraints and photographs in Stenger's home.

Sea Scout Skipper Faces Three Charges Of Child Molesting

The 40-year-old skipper of [redacted] Belmont has been arrested on three counts of child molesting that allegedly have taken place during the past year.

[redacted] Jr., of [redacted] San Carlos, an electronics technician for a Menlo Park firm, posted bail of \$1,250 and was released from San Mateo County Jail following his arrest shortly after 5 p.m. Thursday.

He was arrested on a warrant issued by Municipal Court Judge Rhy Seagraves,

who also issued the search warrant. San Carlos police used to confiscate ropes, chains, harnesses and other paraphernalia that he allegedly used in connection with his victims. Police said the ropes, chains and harnesses were used to restrain his victims, but not for sadistic purposes.

Stenger is charged with three violations of Penal Code Section 268, lewd and lascivious conduct directed toward some one under the age of 14.

According to San Carlos police, Stenger's most recent victims were two 11-year-old boys and one nine-year-old boy, but San Carlos Police Cadet Randy Evans, who did the initial sleuthing in the case, indicated in his report that Stenger's activities may go back as far as 10 years ago.

Evans said he first heard stories six months ago from some of the neighborhood children, but first dismissed them as a joke. He later began to take them seriously, however, and contacted Officer George Doolan, who aided in the investigation that led to the search and arrest warrants.

According to police, Stenger took some of the boys for boat rides, apparently got in connection with the Belmont Sea Scouts, where some of the alleged incidents of molesting took place.

Three Hurt In Crash At Roadside

Three Peninsula men were injured late yesterday afternoon when a car driven by one of them slammed into the other as they were changing a tire on their car alongside Bayshore Freeway in San Mateo.

California Highway Patrolmen said John Watson, 31, of 213 Oakley Ave., Menlo Park, was knocked 40 feet when his disabled car was struck by the car driven by Lemuel Williams, 47, of 284 Pulgas Ave., East Palo Alto.

Watson was admitted to the intensive care unit at the county's Choe Community Hospital in San Mateo, for treatment of multiple injuries, according to a hospital spokesman.

Williams and Watson's companion, Rodney Jacobson, 21, of 453 Upland Road, Redwood City, were treated for cuts and released from the hospital.

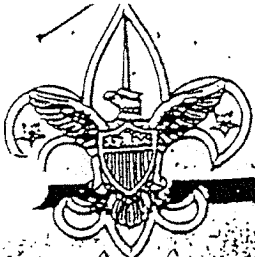

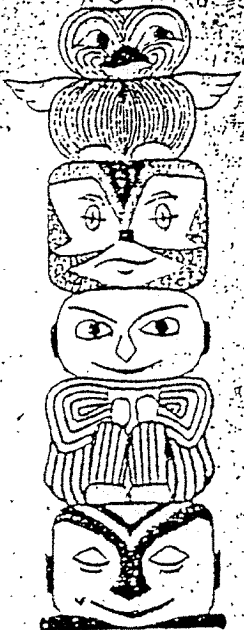

Sea Scout Leader Held For Molesting

A San Carlos electronic technician and former Sea Scout leader was arrested last night on a felony charge of child molesting after three young boys told police he had enticed them into his home on frequent occasions during the past year.

[REDACTED], of 1027 [REDACTED] Street, [REDACTED] was booked at county jail and later released on \$1,250 bail, to appear January 4 at 9 a.m. in Southern District Municipal Court.

Detectives began an investigation after the boys, two age 11 and one age 9, told Police Cadet Randy Evans, a friend of the family of one of the victims, about Stenger's alleged activities.

One of the boys related that on one occasion he accompanied [REDACTED] on a houseboat and was chained to a bed, investigators report. Another boy said he was chained to a chair in Stenger's home for disobedience.

Police Detective Tom Howers reported that investigators obtained a search warrant and found a quantity of harnesses, straps, chains, restraints and photographs in Stenger's home.

Sea Scout Skipper Faces Three Charges Of Child Molesting

The 40-year-old skipper of [redacted] Belmont has been arrested on three counts of child molesting that allegedly have taken place during the past year.

[redacted] Stenger, 227 Riverton Ave., San Carlos, an electronics technician for a Menlo Park firm, posted bail of \$1,250 and was released from San Mateo County Jail following his arrest shortly after 5 p.m. Thursday.

He was arrested on a warrant issued by Municipal Court Judge Roy Seagraves,

who also issued the search warrant. San Carlos police used to confiscate ropes, chains, harnesses and other paraphernalia that he allegedly used in connection with his victims. Police said the ropes, chains and harnesses were used to restrain his victims, but not for sadistic purposes.

Stenger is charged with three violations of Penal Code Section 268, lewd and lascivious conduct directed toward some one under the age of 14.

According to San Carlos police, Stenger's most recent victims were two 11-year-old boys and one nine-year-old boy, but San Carlos Police Cadet Randy Evans, who did the initial sleuthing in the case, indicated in his report that Stenger's activities may go back as far as 10 years ago.

Evans said he first heard stories six months ago from some of the neighborhood children, but first dismissed them as a joke. He later began to take them seriously, however, and contacted Officer George Donlon, who aided in the investigation that led to the search and arrest warrants.

According to police, Stenger took some of the boys for boat rides, apparently not in connection with the Belmont Sea Scouts, where some of the alleged incidents of molesting took place.

Three Hurt In Crash At Roadside

Watson was admitted to the intensive care unit at the county's Chope Community Hospital in San Mateo, for treatment of multiple injuries, according to a hospital spokeswoman.

Williams and Watson's companion, Rodney Jacobson, 21, of 463 Upland Road, Redwood City, were treated for cuts and released from the hospital.

Vandals hit man accused of molestation

Neighbors of a Menlo Park man charged with molesting children want him out of the neighborhood and in police custody.

More than 100 neighbors signed a petition urging he be kept in jail until his trial. He is free on bail until his June 21 arraignment.

"I think we're safer if he's in jail, and I think he's safer," one neighbor said.

The home on Gilbert Avenue has been vandalized since his arrest last week. Windows have been broken and eggs have been thrown against the house.

The man was charged last week with molesting children and lascivious acts with children and false imprisonment.

ment of a 12-year-old boy. Charges stem from an incident in which [redacted] allegedly used a harness to strap the boy to a bed and derived pleasure by watching him struggle to get free, Redwood City police said.

[redacted] slipped with the Sea Scouts, a nautical branch of the Boy Scouts of America. It was on the Scout boat docked in Redwood City, where the alleged incident occurred early this month.

Scout officials, who turned [redacted] police, suspended his membership.

[redacted] guilty in 1972 to contributing to the delinquency of a minor, court records show. He originally had been charged with three counts of child molestation, according to court records. A trial on those charges ended in a hung jury.

[redacted] used to comment Tuesday on current or past charges.

"I don't think the media's the correct place to try this thing," he said. "I think the fair side eventually will come out."

He confirmed he had been involved with Scouting for about 30 years. He was out of the program for three years, around the time of the 1972 case, he said.

[redacted], executive director of the Boy Scouts' San Mateo County chapter, said he will check into whether [redacted] is allowed to be a Scout leader after the 1972 conviction.

"I want to know, personally, how [redacted] about how this was allowed to happen," [redacted] said. "The way we do business now, [redacted] would not be allowed to participate (in Scouting)."

[redacted] released from probation in 1974 after serving more than two years of his four-year sentence. In 1975, he was allowed to be Scout leader

again.

"How that happened or how the decision was made 15 years ago, I don't know," [redacted] said.

One man who has worked with the Sea Scout program for the past 19 years said Stenger's past criminal case was well known in San Mateo County.

"Side comments were made about him and his past," said the man, who requested anonymity.

The man said he and other Scout leaders took no action against Stenger after he was readmitted to the Scout program.

"We raised the questions, but we felt that it was the cause's responsibility," the man said.

The man said members of community groups who recommend people to be Scout leaders also bore some responsibility.

But the man [redacted] "incredibly knowledgeable" about boating and had created strong Sea Scout programs.

In the recent case, police have seized dozens of photographs of young boys in various restraint devices. Detective Ron Maluszak said. The boys often are scantily clad, but none are completely naked.

"He's admitted that he's placed these restraints on these boys," he said. "But he says he didn't do it to harm them."

In the alleged incidents, [redacted] apparently never touched the boys' genitals or committed any sexual acts in front of them, Maluszak said.

Police also seized several short stories written by Stenger, Maluszak said. The essays describe sexual assault on a large and [redacted] of young boys. Many drawings done by Stenger show boys involved in various sexual acts.

As police continue to delve into Stenger's alleged activities, they have found the list of potential victims to be enormous. One man claimed [redacted] lusted him in 1958.

"We're probably going to go back (through) 10 years" of rosters containing the names of Scouts in San Mateo County, said Redwood City police Detective Steve Swartzel.

He had been accused of tying up three young boys in his San Carlos home and fondling them, but the charges were dropped when a mistrial was declared because of a hung jury.

██████████ pleaded guilty to the lesser charge and was suspended from Scouting for several years.

Boy Scout executive ██████████ man, who has been on the job only one year, disputes allegations that he knew Stenger was a risk to the Sea Scouts he supervised.

"I knew he had a problem. I had no idea of the depth of the problem," ██████████ said Wednesday.

"I don't buy they had no clue," responded Detective Ron Matuszak of the Redwood City Police Department.

Screening procedures have been changed so that prospective Scout leaders now are asked to disclose if they have a criminal past, ██████████ is noted.

██████████ said he has asked for an internal review of how and why ██████████ is re-instated.

██████████ merged into the spotlight last week when Redwood City police arrested him on charges of trussing up an 11-year-old boy during an overnight stay aboard a Sea Scout boat docked at the city marina.

They said the panning ██████████ did not molest the tied-up youth or his two companions, but one of the boys reported the incident anyway.

Redwood City police said nearly 20 boys or their parents have called to say ██████████ may have molested them over the past 30 years.

When police arrested ██████████ they found a home filled with harnesses, groin cloths, pictures and drawings of young boys in bondage and a trussed-up mannequin.

Redwood City Detective Steven Switzer said Wednesday that one 24-year-old man came in to the station this morning to report a problem with ██████████ allegedly had aboard an excursion on San Francisco Bay 12 years ago.

The man said ██████████ tossed him into the water and nearly let him drown when he refused to

do a G-string, Switzer said.

On board was another young boy who did put on the apparel, the man reportedly told Switzer.

"He told his father and his father wouldn't believe him," Switzer said.

Police this week were interviewing past and present Sea Scouts to determine how many of them may have been molested.

They reportedly are concentrating on cases that may have occurred in the past six years, before the statute of limitations would have run out.

Deputy District Attorney Susan Griffin said she will review the case within the next week to determine what, if any, charges will be filed.

██████████ told The Times on Monday that the boys were not lying about the recent incident in Redwood City, has been released on \$15,000 bail.

He has been charged with felony child imprisonment, child annoyance and molestation.

Sea Scout parent ██████████ of South San Francisco said she hoped this investigation will not overshadow the good work of the other Sea Scout units in San Mateo County.

Nearly 500 Sea Scouts from throughout Northern California will be gathering at Coast Guard Island in the bay for the 37th annual Ancient Mariner Regatta, including those from ██████████ former unit.

"While this investigation is going on, it should not take away from the regatta," ██████████ said. "We need to have equal time."

██████████ reportedly has been harassed by some of his neighbors who allegedly want him to move out. His home has been the target of vandals, police said.

REDWOOD CITY - A veteran San Mateo County Boy Scout leader who in 1971 admitted to lewd acts with three minor boys has been charged with molesting a 11-year-old boy aboard the Sea Scout boat "Griffin."

Redwood City police said 58- [redacted] G-96 [redacted] Menlo Park, was booked into the county jail on charges of false imprisonment, child annoyance and child molestation.

The suspect, an electronics worker, was arrested Thursday. He's scheduled for arraignment at 1:30 p.m. Monday in Municipal Court.

The alleged incident occurred during a sleep-over May 6 by three

boys and the suspect who the Griffin was docked at Redwood City Marina.

According to Detective Ron Matuzak, the alleged victim was sleeping below deck in a bunk when [redacted] reached a harness restraint between his legs, around the torso area and head. He used small padlocks to keep him in the restraint, which was anchored to the bunk."

The two other scouts on board told police the 5-foot-10, 120-pound [redacted] held the boy struggle to get out of the harness for about 15 minutes before releasing him.

Police learned of the alleged molestation from [redacted] an ex-

executive with the San Mateo County Council of Boy Scouts.

"I was told by the boyfriend of a single man whose son was aboard the boat that something may have happened, and I immediately went to the police," Gorman said Friday.

Screening for volunteers

In recent years, the screening process for potential volunteers has been largely up to the private organizations sponsoring scout units, [REDACTED] said. The sponsor asks an applicant to provide references and then is responsible for checking them, he said.

Police said that when they searched [REDACTED] last week, they found a harness with straps, hundreds of photographs and drawings of juveniles in bondage, leather, nylon and rope restraints, and a bedroom shelf with a 6-foot pile of garbage.

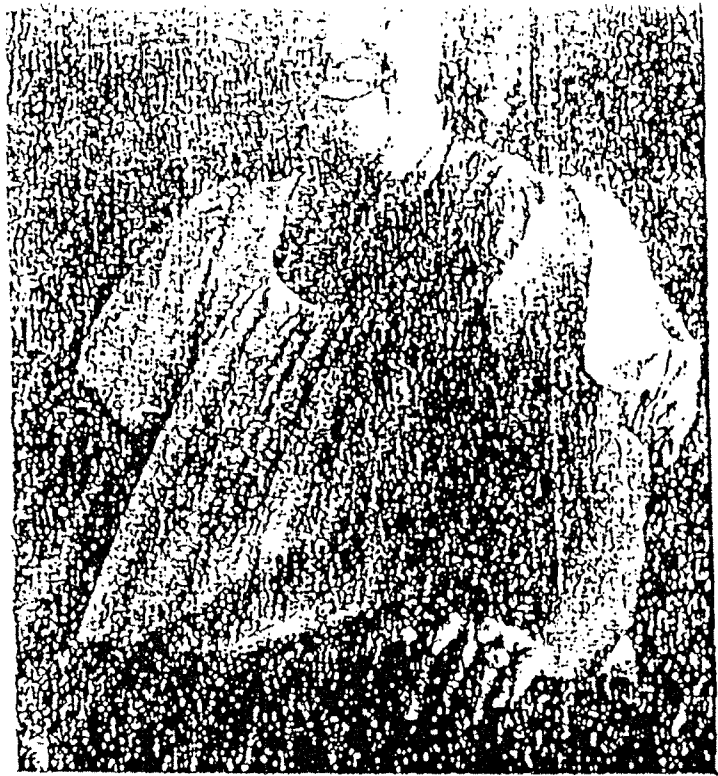

Sexual assault charges facing Menlo Park man

Redwood City police are searching for other possible victims of a veteran boy scout leader arrested this week for allegedly sexually assaulting young scouts.

[REDACTED] of Menlo Park, San Mateo County's Main Jail on charges of lewd and lascivious acts with children and annoying children.

He also was charged with false imprisonment for a May 6 incident in which he allegedly used a harness to strap a 12-year-old boy to his bed.

[REDACTED] 6 feet 10 inches tall and weighs 300 pounds, has not been charged with sexually assaulting the boy. Police Det. Ron Matuszak said [REDACTED] derived pleasure from watching the boy struggle for 15 minutes attempting to free himself.

Three boy scouts told police that [REDACTED] boy to the bed with three padlocks in the harness and watched as the boy tried to free himself, Matuszak said.

One of the three boys said [REDACTED] back and upper thigh.

After receiving a tip from the Boy Scouts of America, police obtained a search warrant for [REDACTED] Avenue in Menlo Park.

They found 30 to 40 restraint devices, more than 100 drawings of children in bondage, and a Polaroid photo of a blindfolded boy estimated to be 8 years old, who was tied to a [REDACTED].

Police also found fantasy stories of children in bondage and "mountains of [REDACTED]" adding that hundreds of pornographic photographs from magazines littered the apartment.

[REDACTED] supervisor for the past 30 years and recently has been a "scout master" or the Sea Scouts program, Matuszak said.

 A 40-year-old Scoutmaster from Menlo Park has been charged with child molestation for allegedly padlocking a Sea Scout into a harness during an overnight trip on a boat. The man, who weighs 320 pounds and stands 5-foot-6, allegedly left the boat Saturday night while on the water with three boys, ages 10, 12 and 14. The boys were asphyxiated, he said, and asked: "Who's going to be the guinea pig tonight?" The man selected one of the boys and fas-

tened him into the harness in front of the others, Detective Ron Matuszak said. The boy dangled in the air for 15 minutes, he said. During an interview after his arrest on Thursday, the man allegedly told police that harnesses had been an obsession for him ever since his father had similarly bound him at age 4. Officers from the San Mateo County Council of Boy Scouts of America reported Stenger, a Scout leader for almost 20 years, to the police Monday. The officials learned of his alleged activities from a man whose girlfriend's son was aboard the boat. "This isn't in the handbook," one of the youngsters, a new Boy Scout, told police.

The man, who lives in the San Mateo County Jail, has been charged with false imprisonment, annoying children, and lewd and lascivious acts with children. He is scheduled to be arraigned Monday. Police shattered the door to his two-bedroom home Thursday, after he refused to allow them inside. A mound of trash toppled over in one room and human excrement was found on the den rug, Matuszak said. All the blinds were shut and dust covered the furnishings in the house, where the man lived for 17 years. Another room was filled with leather and nylon harnesses, chastity belts and sketches. On Monday, May 15, 1989, an incident of child abuse was reported to the San Mateo County Council. I immediately met with the individual in question and suspended his registration. I then contacted the police who began their investigation.

The accompanying newspaper articles are essentially correct and will give you the details. Obviously my concerns, in addition to the harm to the boys, center around the fact that this individual's membership was previously suspended in 1971 for the same reasons it is being suspended now. In 1975, this individual was allowed to re-register.

The one error I see in the newspapers is the anonymous source who claims to know that "Scouting officials" were fully informed of the man's past. I was told shortly after assuming this position in September of 1988, that the gentleman had had a problem in the early '70's after tying a boy to the mast of his Sea Scout ship. I believe this is the same information that my predecessor had.

I'd be happy to accept suggestions or advice on the next steps to take.

Scouts 'devastated' by molest charges

A Sea Scout leader charged last week with child molestation is under investigation for similar incidents dating back more than 30 years, Redwood City police said Monday.

[redacted] Menlo Park is free on \$10,000 bail. He is charged with lewd and lascivious acts with children and false imprisonment of a 12-year-old boy. His arraignment has been set for June 21.

Since [redacted] at least six people have called Redwood City police alleging they also were molested by Stenger, said Lt. Bill Pratt. One man said Stenger allegedly molested him in 1958.

Police will interview callers to confirm their reports, Pratt said. [redacted] a slipper for the San Mateo-based Sea Scouts, said Scout executive [redacted]. It is a branch of the San Mateo Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

In the 1972 case, three San Carlos boys — two 11-year-olds and one 9-year-old — were allegedly molested by Stenger at his former San Carlos residence, records show.

Stenger allegedly put the children in harnesses and chained one boy to a bed, records show. The boys testified in a preliminary hearing in early 1972 that they had been fondled by Stenger.

Evidence seized by police in the 1972 case included leather harnesses, chains, a book about pedophilia and pornographic magazines, records show.

Scouting now checks out leaders

SAN MATEO — Prospective leaders in the Boy Scouts of America now are required to disclose if they have ever been arrested on child-abuse charges, even if there was no conviction.

They are also asked to reveal if they have ever been convicted of any crime or if there is "any fact or circumstance" in their background that would compromise their being entrusted with the care of young people.

"This has been in response to the concern about child abuse," said [redacted] executive director of the San Mateo County Boy Scouts chapter, which has 10,000 scouts and 3,000 volunteers.

That application, revised last year, also asks for character references.

Officials at Boy Scout headquarters in San Mateo do not verify the information. That is left to the parent or other organization sponsoring the particular troop or den.

[redacted] parents to take an active role in investigating the people their children come in contact with, and not to leave it up to the Scouts.

"Parents need to make sure they know their scout leader, that they are people they know from their church and service clubs," he said.

The boy scouts should receive credit for reporting their suspicions about [redacted] Sea Scout leader [redacted] Jr., 58, the Boy Scout executive said.

"This (child molesting) is a societal problem. We're trying to do something," [redacted] said. "You tell them (Scouts) scream and yell."

"And that's exactly what happened in this situation. We're in the child-protection business and we're going to create barriers for these people."

When asked why [redacted] was allowed back into [redacted] after previously being charged (although [redacted] of child molesting, [redacted] ally said, "I don't know."

He said in a subsequent interview he is "endeavoring" to find out who decided Stenger could be re-admitted and why.

A 58-year-old Menlo Park scoutmaster arrested last week on suspicion of child molestation had been charged with the same crime in San Carlos when he was a scoutmaster 18 years ago, police said Monday.

Boy Scouts of America officials knew of the 1971 incident but allowed the man to remain in the organization two years later, police said.

Scout officials said Monday they were unaware of the incident until last week, when they learned the man had been charged with child molestation.

[redacted] selected the youngest boy and placed him in a harness in front of the others; the boy dangled in the air for 15 minutes, and after the overnight, the 15-year-old reported the incident to his mother.

[redacted] told police that he tied up certain boys at night to prevent them from sleepwalking or walking around, Switzer said.

“This guy is in a position of authority and kids are conditioned; especially in Scouting, not to question authority,” Switzer said.

When the police interviewed the three youngsters, the 11-year-old said he had been placed in a harness, during an outing, within the past six months, Switzer said.

Police have received about 20 calls from concerned parents advising anyone whose [redacted] saw [redacted] call them at (415) 780-7100. Switzer said police will try to contact parents whose children may have known Stenger in [redacted].

A former neighbor of Stenger came to police, after seeing a news broadcast, and said he'd been tied up and tickled by [redacted] he was a child, Switzer said.

Youth organization is rocked by sex scandal

REDWOOD CITY — The Boy Scouts are in the thick of a growing scandal today as one of their leaders once again faces bondage charges.

Redwood City police said nearly 70 former and current scouts have come forward to complain they were molested by [REDACTED] over the past 30 years.

"We're really at the tip of the iceberg," said Lt. Bill Pratt of the Redwood City Police Department, which is investigating charges relating to a recent weekend outing at the Redwood City Marina [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] by the Boy Scouts, has been a longtime leader of Sea Scouts, a scouting division for 14 to 16 year olds.

His 30-year volunteer career with the Scouts was interrupted in 1971 when he was charged in San Carlos with tying up and fondling three young boys.

A trial on those felony charges resulted in a hung jury [REDACTED] guilty to

a lesser charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and was re-instated to scouting after completing probation.

Police, court officials and a former victim say they are deeply troubled that Stenger was allowed to associate with male youths again.

"I never dreamed that they would let him back into scouting," said a 29-year-old South County man who was [REDACTED] victims in San Carlos.

"I can't believe they didn't know he wanted to be around little boys."

Boy Scout [REDACTED] He is conducting an investigation into why Stenger was permitted to resume his scouting activities.

[REDACTED] electronics technician, was arrested in his Menlo Park home after Boy Scout officials

repeated the alleged bondage incident.

Police said they found garbage piled 6 feet high in a bedroom of the home, human excrement on the floor, and hundreds of photos and slides [REDACTED]

Stenger said in a telephone interview Monday that he is seeking psychiatric treatment for an undisclosed problem.

When asked if his young accusers were lying, he responded, "No."

He declined to provide the name of his attorney but said he cannot wait for his day in court to clear his name.

When asked about his return to scouting after the previous child-molestation investigation, he said he went back only "after all of the charges were dropped."

None of the 15 boys in his unit has called to offer support, [REDACTED]



"It's hard to put into words," he replied, when questioned about what he would say to them.

Stenger said he cannot elaborate more later, adding, "Perhaps you would like to purchase an interview."

And he made one more request.

years old. "You hate to see an organization like the Boy Scouts suffer, but if I was a parent I would be (upset)," Switzer said. He said Redwood City investigators were called after a 15-year-old boy on his first Sea Scout outing May 6 reported to his mother's boyfriend that Stenger had awakened them in the middle of the night aboard the boat. An 11-year-old was trussed up in a harness that wrapped around his [redacted] panting [redacted] Stenger watched him struggle for 15 minutes, the 15-year-old told Switzer. He said there was no evidence there was any actual touching of the boys, and no indication the boys recognized the "sexual nature" of it. Switzer [redacted] explained that he tied boys up to keep them from falling overboard or sleepwalking. He has shown no remorse for his accused crimes, but has been "talkative and cooperative," according to police. During a police interview about his background, Switzer

said he told investigators he had been put into bondage by his parents. "When he was 4 or 5 he was a 'bad boy' and his parents either harnessed him or chained him to a tree," Switzer said. "He felt secure and humiliated at the same time." While scouting officials scramble to minimize the damage done to Boy Scouts of America's public image, there are those in the organization who say it's too soon to castigate the man known as "Mr. Sea Scout." [redacted] who took over leadership of the Belmont Sea Scouts after [redacted] in 1971, said the most recent Boy Scout newsletter contains not more accolades about [redacted] accomplishments on the sea. While the top scout executives have moved on (officials at the San Mateo headquarters would not provide the names of those in charge before and after [redacted]), Fox said he recalled that the leader was reinstated because his record had been cleared.

"As far as what I heard, he had been found not guilty. You don't judge a man based [redacted] San Mateo County District Attorney Jim Fox, who prosecuted the San Carlos molestation case, said the jury did not believe [redacted] intended to molest the boys when he tied them up. After later pleading guilty to a lesser misdemeanor charge, [redacted] probation and psychiatric counseling. After that probation was completed, he moved to have his record expunged and the guilty plea withdrawn. "He could then say he had no record," Fox said. But that does not justify the Boy Scouts' giving him access again to young boys, the district attorney said. "Our experience with pedophiles is that they are not amenable to treatment," Fox said. "If I had a child in scouting, I would be very concerned." Deputy District Attorney Elaine Tipton, who two years ago successfully prosecuted another local Boy Scout leader on sex charges, said there is no

excuse for [redacted] benefit of the doubt. "I find it shocking they would weigh his proven track record against that risk," she said. "Studies have shown pedophiles (have) one of the highest recidivism rates. To participate in Boy Scouts is not a right — it's a privilege." A 58-year-old Scoutmaster from Menlo Park has been charged with child molestation for allegedly padlocking a Sea Scout into torso harness during an overnight trip on a boat.

The three boys allegedly entered the cabin and asked: "Who's going to be the mufes pla tonight?"

lured him into the boat. The boy dangled in the air for 15 minutes, he said.

During an interview after his arrest on Thursday, Matuszak told police that harnesses had been an obsession for him ever since his father had similarly bound him at age 4, Matuszak said.

No one previously had complained about the Scoutmaster of San Mateo County's 10,000-member Scout chapter. And none of the 15 boys in Steinger's Sea Scout unit previously had spoken of any ill-doings, he said.

The 100 members in the Sea Scouts program learn basic boating skills as well as the usual Boy Scout agenda.

In an effort to better screen applicants for Boy Scout leaders, the organization recently more than

doubled the length of its application form. The group also asks for references and conducts thorough background checks.

But because [redacted] had been with the Scouts for roughly 19 years, the organization had little information about him, [redacted] said. He said his group will consider whether to scrutinize the records of leaders who've been on staff for a number of years.

"We have a good system of trying to ensure that people of good character, with only the best things in mind, work with our children," [redacted] said. "Obviously, it was not foolproof."

Sexual assault charges facing Menlo Park man

Redwood City police are searching for other possible victims of a veteran boy scout leader arrested this week for allegedly sexually assaulting young scouts.

[REDACTED] Menlo Park is being held in San Mateo County's Main Jail on charges of lewd and lascivious acts with children and annoying children.

He also was charged with false imprisonment for a May 6 incident in which he allegedly used a harness to strap a 12-year-old boy to his bed.

[REDACTED] 10 inches tall and weighs 320 pounds, has not been charged with sexually assaulting the boy. Police Det. Ron Maruszak said [REDACTED] "I had pleasure from watching the boy struggle for 15 minutes attempting to free himself."

Three boy scouts told police that [REDACTED] the boy to the bed with three padlocks in the harness and watched as the boy tried to free himself, Maruszak said.

One of the three boys said [REDACTED] his back and upper legs.

After receiving a tip from the Boy Scouts of America, police obtained a search warrant for [REDACTED] 1000 Liberty Avenue in Menlo Park.

They found 30 to 40 restraint devices, more than 100 drawings of children in bondage, and a Polaroid photo of a blindfolded boy estimated to be 6 years old, who was tied to a bed, [REDACTED].

Police also found fantasy stories of children in bondage and "mountains of garbage," [REDACTED] said, adding that hundreds of pornographic photographs from magazines littered the apartment.

[REDACTED] been a boy scout supervisor for the past 30 years and recently has been a "scout master" for the Sea Scouts program, Maruszak said.

Court records show that Stenger was arrested in 1971 of sexually molesting three minors while living in San Carlos. After a guilty plea, he received four years' probation, was ordered not to associate with anyone under 18 and was told to participate in "psychotherapy as long as the probation officer feels it necessary." He also was fined \$500.

Police said that when they searched [redacted] last week, they found a harness with straps, hundreds of photographs and drawings of juveniles in bondage, leather, nylon and rope restraints, and a bedroom filled with a 6-foot pile of garbage.

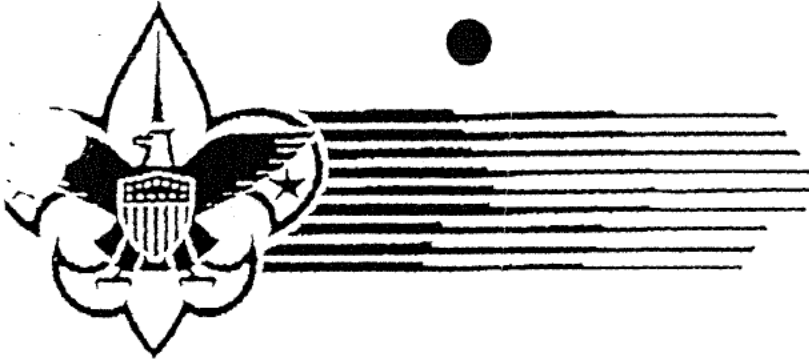

How unfit Scout leaders slip through

In the wake of a Menlo Park scoutmaster's recent arrest on molestation charges, Boy Scout officials and child abuse experts agree there is no foolproof way of screening adults who work among children.

"There's no profile of an abuser or a molester; there's no pen-and-paper test that proves someone

will hurt a child," said Anne Cohn, executive director of the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse. "The person who is totally determined to abuse a child is going to be very hard to stop. But at least we may be able to stop him early on — after one episode, as opposed to 100."

Stenger, 31, was arrested May 11 after an 11-year-old Sea Scout alleged that

Stenger had lechered him in a harness during an overnight outing in Redwood City. Stenger had been charged with similar crimes in San Carlos 18 years ago, which would have prevented him from becoming a scoutmaster if he were applying today, Scout officials said.

"Experts feel now that there is no such thing as effective rehabilitation for these kinds of offenses,"

said Greg Graze, spokesman for the national headquarters of the Boy Scouts of America in Irving, Texas.

Stenger, a 35-year-old electronics engineer, faces charges of false imprisonment, annoying children and lewd and lascivious acts with children. He is scheduled to be arraigned June 21.

A crucial trust

Youth groups work to improve process

Parents today rely more than ever on other adults to take care of their children. Many children spend their days away from their parents. There is day care for toddlers, school for children. And an array of youth groups for all ages. Parents place a great deal of trust in the adults who care for their children.

Local youth group officials maintain that adults are heavily scrutinized before being chosen as youth leaders. But occasionally, a bad apple slips through and taints the image of youth groups nationwide. Such is the case with a Menlo Park Sea Scout leader recently charged with child molestation. Court records show he was charged with similar crimes in 1972. He pleaded guilty to and was convicted of

lesser charges then. And yet, he was let back into the Scouting program. "We've really strengthened our leader selection procedure to deter abusers from entering the ranks of Scouting," said [redacted] with the San Mateo County chapter of the Boy Scouts of America. 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house, he said. The two-step process requires any activity to involve at least two adults and two children. Boys are taught to yell and tell if an adult abuses them.

"Unfortunately, there's just no method for identifying potential offenders," Gormaa said. "We're making it as difficult as possible for them to operate. We have a program that's still one of the best in the community for boys."

Volunteers with Big Brothers-Big Sisters of the Peninsula Inc. go through a five-week screening process before being accepted. The program matches adults with children from single-parent homes.

Big Brothers-Big Sisters applicants are screened over the phone, and casework supervisor Kris Erickson said. Applicants must be at least 21 years old and have a good driving record.

Applicants then visit the agency's office. They are told they will be fingerprinted to check their records with the Department of Justice in Sacramento.

"In doing so, we are screening out people who have a history of criminal acts against children," Erickson said. "I think that when they know we're taking fingerprints, that deters (molesters or abusers). I'd like to think that does some good."

Volunteers fill out applications, which include three references.

Applicants are questioned about the applicants' relationships, personalities and sexual attitudes.

"The number one thing we screen against is a child molester," Erickson said. "We're looking for people with healthy, adult relationships."

Applicants next are interviewed in the office and at their houses. A screening committee pores over pages of information before approving volunteers.

"I think that our process is about as thorough as can be," Erickson said. "I'm real confident that we're doing everything that we can do."

The state Commission on Teacher Credentialing takes fingerprints as one step further. Fingerprints of potential teachers are sent to Sacramento and to the FBI in Washington, D.C.

"If we receive information from either agency that there's been a conviction, then we obtain documentation (police reports and court files)," said Linda Young, staff services analyst.

Once a teacher's fingerprints are on file, the commission will be notified of any future convictions, Young said.

"We used to get charges, but that was unconstitutional because the person had not been convicted," she said.

It is up to local school boards to remove teachers if they have been charged and could pose a threat to children.

Any person with a felony conviction will have his teaching credential pulled or denied, she said.

A person convicted of a misdemeanor involving sex offenses has his credential suspended and the case is reviewed by a committee, she said. The person has a right to a hearing if his credential will be revoked, suspended or denied.

In the seven years Young has been with the commission, she said, only one teacher fell through the cracks. It was discovered when the teacher called the commission to find out the fate of his credential since he had been convicted of a crime.

"If a person should slip through," she said, "eventually we get them because someone will file a complaint. They don't stay out there."

Child care workers in California must be licensed by the Department of Social Services, said Phyllis Eversole, district manager.

The state's licensing process includes a fingerprint check through Sacramento and reference checks, she said.

"Certainly all parents are concerned about their children being safe," said Michael Sullivan, executive director of Palo Alto Community Child Care. "We try to deal with it by hiring really good people. The furthest thing from their minds is abusing kids."

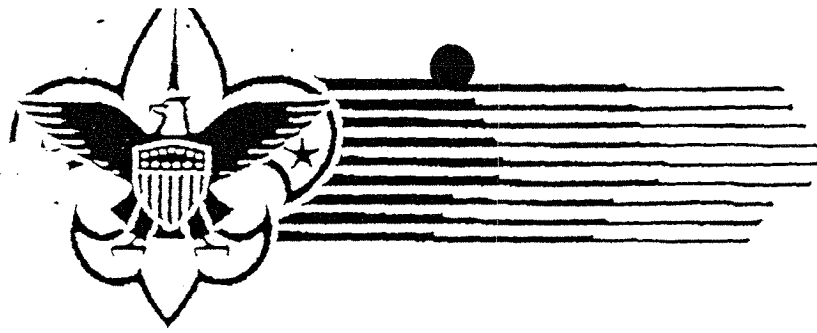

Vandals hit man accused of molestation

Neighbors of a Menlo Park man charged with molesting children want him out of the neighborhood and in police custody.

More than 50 neighbors petitioned for a writ of habeas corpus, urging he be kept in jail until his trial. He is free on bail until his June 21 arraignment.

"I think we're safer if he's in jail, and I think he's safer," one neighbor said.

The man's home has been vandalized since his arrest last week. Windows have been broken and eggs have been thrown against the house.

The man was charged last week with molesting children, lascivious acts with children and false imprisonment.

ment of a 12-year-old boy. Charges stem from an incident in which [redacted] used a harness to strap the boy to a bed and derived pleasure by watching him struggle to get free, Redwood City police said.

[redacted] skipper with the Sea Scouts, a nautical branch of the Boy Scouts of America. It was on the Scout boat, docked in Redwood City, where the alleged incident occurred early this month.

Scout officials, who turned [redacted] over to police, suspended his membership.

[redacted] in 1972 to contributing to the delinquency of a minor, court records show. He originally had been charged with three counts of child molestation, according to court records. A trial on those charges ended in a hung jury.

[redacted] would not comment Tuesday on current or past charges.

"I don't think the media's the correct place to try this thing," he said. "I think the fair side eventually will come out."

He confirmed he had been involved with Scouting for about 30 years. He was out of the program for three years, around the time of the 1972 case, he said.

[redacted] executive director of the Boy Scouts' San Mateo County chapter, said he will check into why [redacted] would be a Scout leader after the 1972 conviction.

"I want to know, personally, how this came about, how this was allowed to happen," [redacted] said. "The way we do business now, [redacted] would not be allowed to participate (in Scouting)."

[redacted] was removed from probation in 1974 after serving more than two years of his four-year sentence. In 1975, he was allowed to be Scout leader

again.

"How that happened or how the decision was made 15 years ago, I don't know," [redacted] said.

One man who has worked with the Sea Scout program for the past 19 years said Stenger's past criminal case was well known in San Mateo County.

"Side comments were made about him and his past," said the man, who requested anonymity.

The man said he and other Scout leaders took no action against [redacted] when he was readmitted to the Scout program.

"We raised the questions, but we felt that it was the council's responsibility," the man said.

The man said members of community groups who recommend people to be Scout leaders also bore some responsibility.

But he said [redacted] is "incredibly knowledgeable" about boating and had created strong Sea Scout programs.

In the recent case, police have seized dozens of photographs showing boys in various restraint devices, Detective [redacted] said. The boys often are scantily clad, but none are completely naked.

"He's admitted that he's placed these restraints on these boys," he said. "But he says he didn't do it to harm them."

In the alleged incident, [redacted] apparently never touched the boys' genitals or committed any sexual acts in front of them, Matuszak said.

Police also seized several short stories written by [redacted] Matuszak said. The essays describe sexual assault, abuse and discipline of young boys. Many drawings done by [redacted] boys involved in various sexual acts.

As police continue to delve into [redacted] alleged activities, they have found the list of [redacted] victims to be enormous. One man claimed [redacted] molested him in 1958.

"We're probably going to go back (through) 10 years" of rosters containing the names of Scouts in [redacted] Redwood City police Detective Steve [redacted] said.

He had been accused of tying up three young boys in his San Carlos home and fondling them, but the charges were dropped when a mistrial was declared because of a hung jury.

He pled guilty to the lesser charge and was suspended from Scouting for several years.

Redwood City police said nearly 20 boys or their parents have called to say Stenger may have molested them over the past 30 years.

When police arrested [redacted] they found a home filled with harnesses, groin cloths, pictures and drawings of young boys in bondage and a trussed-up mannequin.

Redwood City Detective Steve Switzer said Wednesday that one 24-year-old man came in to the station to report a problem [redacted] allegedly had aboard an excursion on San Francisco Bay 12 years ago.

The man said [redacted] threw him into the water and nearly let him drown when he refused to

On board was another young boy who did put on the apparel, the [redacted] reportedly told Switzer.

"He told his father and his father wouldn't believe him," Switzer said.

Police this week were interviewing past and present Sea Scouts to determine how many of them may have been molested.

They reportedly are concentrating on cases that may have occurred in the past six years, before the statute of limitations would have run out.

Deputy District Attorney Susan Griffin said she will review the case within the next week to determine what, if any, charges would be filed.

[redacted] on Monday that the boys were not lying about the recent incident in Redwood City, has been released on \$15,000 bail.

He has been charged with felony child imprisonment, child annoyance and molestation.

Sea Scout parent [redacted] of South San Francisco said she hoped this investigation will not overshadow the good work of the other Sea Scout units in San Mateo County.

Nearly 500 Sea Scouts from throughout Northern California will be gathering at Coast Guard Island in the bay for the 37th annual Ancient Mariner Regatta, including those [redacted] former unit.

"While this investigation is going on, it should not take away from the regatta," [redacted] said. "We need to have equal time."

[redacted] has been harassed by [redacted] his neighbors who allegedly want him to move out. His home has been the target of vandals, police said.

REDWOOD CITY — A veteran San Mateo County Boy Scout leader who in 1971 admitted to lewd acts with three minor boys has been charged with molesting an 11-year-old boy aboard the Sea

Redwood City police said 58-year-old [redacted] Menlo Park, was booked into the county jail on charges of false imprisonment, child annoyance and child molestation.

The suspect, an electronics worker, was arrested Thursday. He's scheduled for arraignment at 1:30 p.m. Monday in Municipal Court.

The alleged incident occurred during a sleep-over May 6 by three

boys and the suspect while the [redacted] was docked at Redwood City Marina.

According to Detective Ron Matuzak, the alleged victim was sleeping below deck in a bunk when [redacted] attached a harness restraint between his legs, around the torso area and head. He used small padlocks to keep him in the restraint, which was anchored to the bunk.

The two other scouts on board told police the 5-foot-10, 320-pound [redacted] watched the boy struggle to get out of the harness for about 15 minutes before releasing him.

Police learned of the alleged molestation from [redacted], an ex-

Screening for volunteers

In recent years, the screening process for potential volunteers has been largely up to the private organizations sponsoring scout units, [REDACTED]. The sponsor asks an applicant to provide references and then is responsible for checking them, he said.

[REDACTED] has been affiliated with the county's Sea Explorer Unit, a scout group for older boys since 1975, and had been with the organization since 1971, although "not continuously." He said he did not know if Stenger's references had been checked when he became a volunteer.

He declined comment as to whether the Scout Council was aware of the 1971 molestation charges 17 years ago.

[REDACTED] Scout Council has a longstanding policy that there must be at least two boys and two adults at any scouting function.

[REDACTED] told me that another volunteer leader was supposed to be there. We have a very good system in place to prevent something like this, but nothing is foolproof. This got by us," [REDACTED] said.

Earlier accusation

Court records show that [REDACTED] who is single, was accused in 1971 of sexually molesting three minors while living in San Carlos.

After a guilty plea, he received four years' probation, was ordered not to associate with anyone under 18 and was told to participate in "psychotherapy as long as the probation officer feels it necessary." He also was fined \$500.

Police said that when they searched [REDACTED] the last week, they found a man's with straps, hundreds of photographs and drawings of juveniles in bondage, leather, nylon and rope restraints, and a bedroom filled with a 6-foot pile of garbage.

A 38-year-old Scoutmaster from Menlo Park has been charged with child molestation for allegedly padlocking a Sea Scout into torso harness during an overnight trip on a

[REDACTED] who weighs 320 pounds and stands 5-foot-6, allegedly lashed the boy last Saturday night while on the boat with three boys, ages 10, 12 and

The three were asleep when [REDACTED] allegedly entered the cabin and asked, "Who's going to be the guinea pig tonight?"

[REDACTED] selected one of the boys and fas-

tened him into the harness in front of the others, Detective Ron Matuszak said. The boy dangled in the air for 15 minutes, he said.

During a [REDACTED] after his arrest on Thursday, [REDACTED] allegedly told police that harnesses had been an obsession for him ever since his father had similarly bound him at age 4, Matuszak said.

Officials from the San Mateo County Council of Boy Scouts of America reported Steninger, a Scout leader for almost 20 years, to the police Monday. The officials learned of his alleged activities from a man whose girlfriend's son was aboard the boat.

"This isn't in the handbook," one of the youngsters, a new Boy Scout, told police.

[REDACTED] the San Mateo County jail, has been charged with false imprisonment, annoying children, and lewd and lascivious acts with children. He is scheduled to be arraigned Monday.

Police shattered the door to his two-bedroom home Thursday, after he refused to allow them inside. A mound of trash toppled over in one room and human excrement was found on the den rug, Matuszak said. All of the blinds were shut and dust covered furnishings in the house, where [REDACTED] had lived for 17 years.

Another room was filled with leather and nylon harnesses, chastity belts and sketches

of young boys. Police said they found "dozens" of slides of boys strapped in harnesses and G-strings, and "half a dozen" snapshots of a blindfolded Asian boy 8 to 8 years old tied to a bed.

No one previously had complained about [REDACTED] Tim [REDACTED] executive of San Mateo County's 10,000-member Scout chapter. And none of the 15 boys in Stenger's Sea Scout unit previously had spoken of any ill-doings, he said.

Sexual assault charges facing Menlo Park man

Redwood City police are searching for other possible victims of a veteran boy scout leader arrested this week for allegedly sexually assaulting young scouts.

[REDACTED] Menlo Park is being held in San Mateo County's Main Jail on charges of lewd and lascivious acts with children and annoying children.

He also was charged with false imprisonment for a May 6 incident in which he allegedly used a harness to strap a 12-year-old boy to his bed.

[REDACTED] inches tall and weighs 320 pounds, has not been charged with sexually assaulting the boy. Police Det. Ron Matuszak said [REDACTED] allegedly derived pleasure from watching the boy struggle for 15 minutes attempting to free himself.

Three boy scouts told police that [REDACTED] tied the boy to the bed with three padlocks in the harness and watched as the boy tried to free himself, Matuszak said.

One of the three boys said [REDACTED] his back and upper thigh.

After receiving a tip from the Boy Scouts of America, police obtained a search warrant for [REDACTED] on Gilbert Avenue in Menlo Park.

They found 30 to 40 restraint devices, more than 100 drawings of children in bondage, and a Polaroid photo of a blindfolded boy estimated to be 8 years old, who was tied to a bed, Matuszak said.

Police also found fantasy stories of children in bondage and "mountains of garbage," Matuszak said, adding that hundreds of pornographic photographs from magazines littered the apartment.

[REDACTED] boy scout supervisor for the past 30 years and recently has been a "scout master" for the Sea Scouts program, Matuszak said.

Anyone with information on other possible incidents of molestation is asked to call the Redwood City Police Department, (415) 780-100.

On Monday, May 15, 1989, an incident of child abuse was reported to the San Mateo County Council. I immediately met with the individual in question and suspended his registration. I then contacted the police who began their investigation.

The accompanying newspaper articles are essentially correct and will give you the details. Obviously my concerns, in addition to the harm to the boys, center around the fact that this individual's membership was previously suspended in 1971 for the same reasons it is being suspended now. In 1975, this individual was allowed to re-register.

The one error I see in the newspapers is the anonymous source who claims to know that "Scouting officials" were fully informed of the man's past. I was told shortly after assuming this position in September of 1988, that the gentleman had had a problem in the early '70's after tying a boy to the mast of his Sea Scout ship. I believe this is the same information that my predecessor had.

I'd be happy to accept suggestions or advice on the next steps to take.

Scouts 'devastated' by molest charges

A Sea Scout leader charged last week with child molestation is under investigation for similar incidents dating back more than 30 years, Redwood City police said Monday.

[redacted] Menlo Park is free on bail. He is charged with lewd and lascivious acts with children and false imprisonment of a 12-year-old boy. His arraignment has been set for June 21.

Since reports [redacted] first, at least six people have called Redwood City police alleging they also were molested by Stenger, said Lt. Bill Pratt. One man said Stenger allegedly molested him in 1956.

Police will interview callers to confirm their accusations, he said. [redacted] skipper for the San Mateo-based Sea Scouts said Scout executive [redacted] It is a branch of the San Mateo Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

Scouting now checks out leaders

SAN MATEO — Prospective leaders in the Boy Scouts of America now are required to disclose if they have ever been arrested on child-abuse charges, even if there was no conviction.

They are also asked to reveal if they have ever been convicted of any crime or if there is "any fact or circumstance" in their background that would compromise their being entrusted with the care of young people.

"This has been in response to the concern about child abuse," said [redacted] executive director of the San Mateo County Boy Scouts chapter, which has 10,000 scouts and 3,000 volunteers.

That application, revised last year, also asks for character references.

Officials at Boy Scout headquarters in San Mateo do not verify the information, Gorman said. That is left to the church or other organization sponsoring the particular troop or den.

[redacted] parents to take an active role in investigating the people their children come in contact with, and not to leave it up to the Scouts.

"Parents need to make sure they know their scout leader, that they are people they know from their church and service clubs," he said.

The boy scouts should receive credit for reporting their suspicions about suspended Sea Scout leader Richard [redacted] Stanger of the Boy Scouts of America.

"This (child molesting) is a societal problem. We're trying to do something," [redacted] said. "You tell them (Scouts) scream and yell."

If the boys involved in the alleged incident aboard the Sea Scout ship [redacted] request counselling, [redacted] said it will be provided.

Youth organization is rocked by sex scandal

REDWOOD CITY — The Boy Scouts are in the thick of a growing scandal today as one of their leaders once again faces bondage charges.

Redwood City police said nearly 20 former and current scouts have come forward to complain that [redacted] by [redacted] Stenger over the past 30 years.

"We're really at the tip of the iceberg," said Lt. Bill Pratt of the Redwood City Police Department, which is investigating charges relating to a recent weekend outing at the Redwood City Marina.

[redacted] led last week by the Boy Scouts, has been a longtime leader of Sea Scouts, a scouting division for 14 to 16 year olds.

His 30-year volunteer career with the Scouts was interrupted in 1971 when he was charged in San Carlos with tying up and fondling three young boys.

A trial on those felony charges resulted in a hung jury. [redacted] pled guilty to

a lesser charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and was re-instated to scouting after completing probation.

Police, court officials and a former victim say they are deeply troubled that Stenger was allowed to associate with male youths again.

"I never dreamed that they would let him back into scouting," said a 29-year-old South County man who was one of [redacted] year-old victims in San Carlos.

"I can't believe they didn't know he wanted to be around little boys."

Boy Scout executive [redacted] that he is cooperating in an investigation into why [redacted] was permitted to resume his scouting activities.

[redacted] pound electronics technician, was arrested in his Menlo Park home after Boy Scout officials

reported the alleged bondage incident.

Police said they found garbage piled 6 feet high in a bedroom of the home, human excrement on the floor, and hundreds of photos and slides of young boys tied up.

[redacted] a telephone interview initially that he is seeking psychiatric treatment for an undisclosed problem.

When asked if his young accusers were lying, he responded, "No."

He declined to provide the name of his attorney but said he cannot wait for his day in court to clear his name.

When asked about his return to scouting after the previous child-molestation investigation, he said he went back only "after all of the charges were dropped."

None of the 15 boys in his unit has [redacted] offer support,



"It's hard to put into words," he replied, when questioned about what he would say to them.

[redacted] he could elaborate more later, adding, "Perhaps you would like to purchase an interview."

And he made one more request.

years old.

"You hate to see an organization like the Boy Scouts suffer, but if I was a parent I would be (upset)," Switzer said.

He said Redwood City investigators were called after a 15-year-old boy on his first Sea Scout outing May 6 reported to his mother's boyfriend that [redacted] awakened them in the middle of the night aboard the boat.

An 11-year-old was trussed up in a harness that wrapped around his groin while a panting Stenger watched him struggle for 15 minutes, the 15-year-old told Switzer.

He said there was no evidence there was any actual touching of the boys, and no indication the boys recognized the "sexual nature" of it.

Switzer said [redacted] explained that he tied boys up to keep them from falling overboard or sleepwalking.

He has shown no remorse for his accused crimes, but has been "talkative and cooperative," according to police.

During a police interview about his background [redacted]

said he told investigators he had been put into bondage by his parents.

"When he was 4 or 5 he was a 'bad boy' and his parents either harnessed him or chained him to a tree," Switzer said. "He felt secure and humiliated at the same time."

While scouting officials scramble to minimize the damage done to Boy Scouts of America's public image, there are those in the organization who say it's too soon to castigate the man known as "Mr. Sea Scout."

[redacted] mont, who took over leadership of the Belmont Sea Scouts after [redacted] moved in 1971, said the most recent Boy Scout newsletter contains yet more accolades about Stenger's accomplishments on the seas.

While the top scout executives have moved on (officials at the San Mateo headquarters would not provide the names of those in charge before [redacted])

[redacted] d he recalled that the leader was reinstated because his record had been cleared.

"As far as what I heard, he had been found not guilty. You don't judge [redacted] based on the hearsay."

San Mateo County District Attorney Jim Fox, who prosecuted the San Carlos molestation case, said the jury did not believe that Stenger intended to molest the boys when he tied them up.

After later pleading guilty to a lesser misdemeanor charge, [redacted] received probation and psychological counseling. After that probation was completed, he moved to have his record expunged and the guilty plea withdrawn.

"He could then say he had no record," [redacted]

But that does not justify the Boy Scouts' giving him access again to young boys, the district attorney said.

"Our experience with pedophiles is that they are not amenable to treatment," [redacted] said. "If I had a child in scouting, I would be very concerned."

Deputy District Attorney Elaine Tipton, who two years ago successfully prosecuted another local Boy Scout leader on sex charges, said there is no

excuse for giving [redacted] the benefit of the doubt.

"I find it shocking they would weigh his proven track record against that risk," she said. "Studies have shown pedophiles (have) one of the highest recidivism rates. To participate in Boy Scouts is not a right — it's a privilege."

A longtime scout leader who has known [redacted] more than 20 years said scouting officials should be held accountable because they were more concerned about [redacted] them for examination of character than they were about children being molested.

Top-level officials including [redacted] has been on the job one year) and predecessors going back to 1971, were fully informed of [redacted] problems, said [redacted] this local resident, who requested anonymity.

"It was common knowledge to those in charge," he said. "I'm sick as sin I didn't do more. This could have been stopped five years ago."

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Scoutmaster held in molestation

Menlo Park man accused of lewd, lascivious acts with children

A 58-year-old Scoutmaster from Menlo Park has been charged with child molestation for allegedly padlocking a Sea Scout into a torso harness during an overnight trip on a boat.

[REDACTED], who weighs 320 pounds and stands 5-foot-6, allegedly tethered the boy last Saturday night while on the docked boat with three boys, ages 10, 12 and 14.

The three were asleep when [REDACTED] allegedly entered the cabin and asked: "Who's going to be the gulch pig tonight?"

[REDACTED] told one of the boys and fas-

tened him into the harness in front of the others, Detective Ron Matuszak said. The boy dangled in the air for 15 minutes, he said.

During an interview after his arrest on Thursday, [REDACTED] allegedly told police that harnesses had been an obsession for him ever since his father had similarly bound him at age 4, Matuszak said.

Officials from the San Mateo County Council of Boy Scouts of America reported Stanger, a Scout leader for almost 20 years, to the police Monday. The officials learned of his alleged activities from a man whose girlfriend's son was aboard the boat.

"This isn't in the handbook," one of the youngsters, a new Boy Scout, told police.

[REDACTED] held at the San Mateo County jail, has been charged with false imprisonment, annoying children, and lewd and lascivious acts with children. He is scheduled to be arraigned Monday.

Police shattered the door to his two-bedroom home Thursday, after he refused to allow them inside. A mound of trash toppled over in one room and human excrement was found on the den rug, Matuszak said. All of the blinds were shut and dust covered furnishings in the house, where Stanger had lived for 17 years.

Another room was filled with leather and nylon harnesses, chastity belts and sketches

of young boys. Police said they found "dozens" of slides of boys strapped in harnesses and G-strings, and "half a dozen" snapshots of a blindfolded Asian boy 6 to 8 years old tied to a bed.

No one previously had complained about [REDACTED] and Jim Gorman, executive of San Mateo County's 10,000-member Scout chapter. And none of the 15 boys in [REDACTED] unit previously had spoken of any ill-doings, he said.

The 100 members in the Sea Scouts program learn basic boating skills as well as the usual Boy Scout agenda.

In an effort to better screen applicants for Boy Scout leaders, the organization recently more than

doubled the length of its application form. The group also asks for references and conducts thorough background checks, said Warren Merritt, business manager of the Stanford Area chapter.

But because [REDACTED] had been with the Scouts for roughly 19 years, the organization had little information about him, Gorman said. He said his group will consider whether to scrutinize the records of leaders who've been on staff for a number of years.

"We have a good system of trying to ensure that people of good character, with only the best things in mind, work with our children," [REDACTED] said. "Obviously, it was not foolproof."

Sexual assault charges facing Menlo Park man

Redwood City police are searching for other possible victims of a veteran boy scout leader arrested this week for allegedly sexually assaulting young scouts.

[REDACTED] Menlo Park is being held in Alameda County's Main Jail on charges of lewd and lascivious acts with children and annoying children.

He also was charged with false imprisonment for a May 8 incident in which he allegedly used a harness to strap a 12-year-old boy to his bed.

[REDACTED] feet 10 inches tall and weighs 210 pounds, has not been charged with sexually assaulting the boy. Police Det. Ron Matuszak said Stegner allegedly derived pleasure from watching the boy struggle for 15 minutes attempting to free himself.

Three boy scouts told police that [REDACTED] forced the boy to the bed with three padlocks in the harness and watched as the boy tried to free himself, Matuszak said.

One of the three boys said [REDACTED] massaged his back and [REDACTED].

After receiving a tip from the Boy Scouts of America, police obtained a search warrant for [REDACTED] on Gilbert Avenue.

They found 30 to 40 restraint devices, more than 100 drawings of children in bondage, and a Polaroid photo of a blindfolded boy estimated to be 6 years old, who was tied to a bed, Matuszak said.

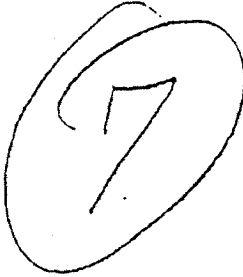
Police also found fantasy stories of children in bondage and "mountains of garbage," Matuszak said, adding that hundreds of pornographic photographs from magazines littered the apartment.

San Mateo Scout leader arrested in molest case

REDWOOD CITY — A veteran San Mateo County Boy Scout leader who in 1971 admitted to lewd acts with three minor boys has been charged with molesting an 11-year-old boy aboard the Sea

Redwood City police said 58-year-old Richard [redacted] of Menlo Park, was booked in county jail on charges of false imprisonment, child annoyance and child molestation.

The suspect, an electronics worker, was arrested Thursday. He's scheduled for arraignment at 1:30 p.m. Monday in Municipal Court.

The alleged incident occurred during a sleep-over May 6 by three

boys and the suspect while the Griffin was docked at Redwood City Marina.

According to Detective Ron Matuzsak, the alleged victim was sleeping below deck in a bunk when [redacted] attached a harness restraint between his legs, around the torso area and head. He used small padlocks to keep him in the restraint, which was anchored to the bunk.

The two other scouts on board told police the 5-foot-10, 320-pound Stenger watched the boy struggle to get out of the harness for about 15 minutes before releasing him.

Police learned of the alleged molestation from [redacted]

"I was told by the boyfriend of a single mom whose son was aboard the boat that something may have happened, and I immediately went to the police [redacted] Friday.

Screening for volunteers

In recent years, the screening process for potential volunteers has been largely up to the private organizations sponsoring scout units, [redacted] sponsor asks an applicant to provide references and then is responsible for checking them, he said.

[redacted] been affiliated with the county's Sea Explorer Unit, a scout group for older boys since 1975, and had been with the organization since 1971, although "not continuously." He said he did not know [redacted] references had been checked when he became a volunteer.

He declined comment as to whether the Scout Council was aware of the 1971 molestation charges 17 years ago.

County Scout Council [redacted] policy that there must be at least two boys and two adults at any scouting function.

[redacted] told me that another volunteer leader was supposed to be there. We have a very good system in place to prevent something like this, but nothing is foolproof. This got by us [redacted] said.

Earlier accusation

[redacted] ger, who is single, was accused in 1971 of sexually molesting three minors while living in San Carlos.

After a guilty plea, he received four years' probation, was ordered not to associate with anyone under 18 and was told to participate in "psychotherapy as long as the probation officer feels it necessary." He also was fined \$500.

Police said that when they searched [redacted] week, they found [redacted] with straps, hundreds of photographs and drawings of juveniles in bondage, leather, nylon and rope restraints, and a bedroom filled with a 6-foot pile of garbage.

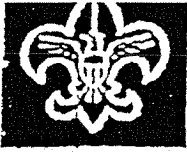

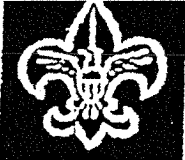

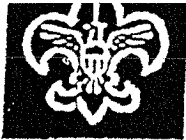
